Davidson's Lore

I tend to forget how dependent I am on computers until they fail. I hooked up my old home computer as a backup, but two days later it started moving very slowly, and then the printer stopped taking direction from the computer. Now I'm down to my laptop – which has started working more slowly. Macs are seldom infected with viruses, though this sounds like one to my computer-illiterate ears.

But it's made me realize that, to use an old sci-fi term, we are all becoming Cyborgs: hybrids of human and machine, unable to function well if the machines aren't working. It's an unnerving and unpleasant feeling!

One theme this fall is making us all more aware and informed about our rich and many-layered heritage as people seeking Honest Religion. That spirit – I identify it with the spirit of liberal religion – is easy to trace back about 4700 years. It's prehistoric, the spirit that will question and examine and doubt everything, in search of those things that are worth holding to, those centers that seem to ground us and inspire us with a life-giving vision.

The past week has made me reflect on the fact that one message of all good religion in all times and places has been how intimately we are connected to everything around us, how we're most complete and whole only when those connections are alive and well.

If there's one thing I'm quite sure that Gilgamesh, the writers of the Upanishads, Confucius, Lao Tzu, the Buddha, Jesus and the rest of them did <u>not</u> mean, it was about how our "wholeness" and connection to "the All" is hampered when our Macs crash. Yet think of how much contact we'd lose – and important contact, don't you think? – without e-mail, text messaging, cell phones and voice mail! We have really evolved – in at least a "soft" kind of evolution – into a Cyborg form of life, haven't we?

It's too much to go into for now. I'll have my machine get in touch with your machine, and if their systems and software are compatible, maybe we'll make contact in a virtual sort of way.

19 October: An Early Unitarian Heretic Davidson Loehr

If the Congregationalist minister William Ellery Channing named and thereby created "Unitarian Christianity" in 1819, the fledgling movement already had its first – and still most famous – heretic by 1838. Ralph Waldo Emerson – no longer even a "Unitarian Christian" was America's first public intellectual. In 1838 he gave an address at Harvard Divinity School in which he said the Unitarians were already on the wrong track. He didn't draw on the Bible at all, but on some basic Hindu thought from the Upanishads. He wasn't invited back to Harvard for over three decades. (Emerson was also famous for saying that Unitarianism was "corpse-cold.") This church was first founded in 1892 by a student of Emerson's which gives us a more direct connection to him than to any other Unitarian thinker. What was he about? How was it liberal religion? President's Corner

The Board of Trustees had another packed agenda at our September meeting. Sean Hale, our Executive Director, and Brian Ferguson, our Ministerial Intern, attended for the first time. Both partici-

pated and provided valuable contributions to the discussions. It was great to hear new perspectives and I look forward to the changing dynamics their presence will bring to the meetings.

Besides the usual financial and staff reports, the following are a few of the issues the board heard and considered in September:

Safety at the church is a priority. Lara Douglass and Nell Newton discussed child safety and building security. An APD officer did a walk-through and made suggestions about our alarm system, outdoor lighting, access, and traffic flow. Recommendations and implementation are to come regarding these safety concerns that are an inevitable part of growth.

The Policy Governance Task Force (Michael West, Derek Howard, Rose Ann Reeser), has been working to assess how to transition to a more staff-managed organizational model, so that our volunteer leaders can focus more on the bigger picture and vision for the future. The task force is gathering input from other congregations that use policy governance, from leaders within our church, and from organizations that assist nonprofits in organizational issues. The road to implementation will include developing Ends Statements, defining the roles of board and staff, and creating tools to measure our progress.

New Opportunities to Volunteer at People's Community Clinic

"Bubble Gum and Service"

My grandmother shaped the moral and ethical foundations of her children and grandchildren perhaps more than any other

person. From fostering a spirit of service to censuring gum chewing, she left an indelible mark on our family.

Mimi couldn't stand bubble gum and never wanted to see her children chew it. This goes beyond the practical matter of chewing gum ending up where it doesn't belong, like hair, shoes, upholstery, and the like. She told her children that they could only chew it on Wednesdays, and only so long as they sat outside on the porch, because they looked like cows chewing their cud while they did it!

My grandmother didn't just give guidance that would haunt our adult relationship with candy. Through her words, expectations, and personal example she encouraged us to grow and pursue excellence. This year, I've given a good deal of thought to her classic line:

"Remember who you are and what you represent." We couldn't get out the door without her saying that to us. As a child I thought she just meant "make us proud."

In college, under the influence of Juliana Hatfield, Nietzsche, and some Greek philosophers, I came to see that perhaps she also meant "become who you are" and "know yourself." As a student away from home for this first time, I found these messages quite liberating.

Today, Mimi's words also mean knowing my personal mission, putting my talents to use, and understanding what I contribute to this world. When I think about when I've felt most fulfilled, I always come back to service. or, I love to help individuals and organizations succeed.

Sometimes this can be as easy as showing a young musician a new guitar lick. At other times, this means a longterm commitment to helping an organization, like the one I worked for over the last nine years, achieve its full potential. Although I feel comfortable in the spotlight or leading a crowd, it can never match the thrill or satisfaction of this kind of service.

Whether its fate, serendipity, or just luck, I feel very grateful for this opportunity to serve you and this church community. For fifty years, you've accomplished great things that enrich our minds, enrich our spirits, and enrich our community. Moreover, your tremendous enthusiasm and excitement for building a better world fill me with hope. So I look forward to helping a great organization and great people achieve bigger and better things. I hope, also, to fulfill my calling and make my grandmother proud. *Sean Hale, Executive Director*

Split the Plate for October

On October 5, our split-the-plate beneficiary will be Casa Marianella, which provides safe temporary shelter for immigrants and refugees in Austin. Founded in 1985, Casa Marianella expanded four years ago by opening a second house to accommodate single women with children. Its facilities have been filled to capacity ever since. Casa provides residents with needed services such as English-language instruction, information on nutrition and child care, and job training. The Central Texas Immigrant Worker Rights Center, established by Casa Marianella, informs workers of their rights and assists them in the recovery of unpaid wages.

Our split-the-plate recipient on October 19 will be the Unitarian Universalist United Nations Office-Ghana Project. The mission of UU-UNO is "empowering Unitarian Universalists to participate in the UN's work to build a just international community." For \$60, school fees, books and uniforms can be provided to send a child to school for one year. A child can be assured of a primary and secondary education with \$600. The Ghana Project grew out of the desire to do something about AIDS in Africa. Education is the most important factor in slowing the spread of AIDS.

Sean Hale, new Executive Director, strikes a chord with First UU By Mark Kilpatrick



As bass guitarist in a band, Sean Hale learned what's required to produce good music. "I don't feel like I need to be the Eddie Van Halen guitarist out front," he says. "You need a good bass player to make the band work." Sean, who on Sept. 2 became the first Executive Director of First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin, approaches his new position in

much the same way — blend into the background, pluck the right notes and make sure the band ... in this case, First UU... keeps the beat. If the band metaphor strikes the wrong chord with you, Sean puts it another way: If this were a cruise ship, he and the office staff would ensure that the engine runs, the lights stay on and the programs get the support they need for a successful journey. Smooth sailing is the goal.

In June 2007, First UU's Board of Trustees set as its highest priority for 2008 the hiring of an executive director, in the hopes of ensuring smooth sailing at the church. Over several years, it had grown increasingly clear that the staff was too small to handle the needs of the third-largest UUA congregation in the Southwest District and that First UU had grown too large to expect the Board of Trustees to continue handling administrative matters. They cited board turnover, a desire for consistency, supervision of staff and efficiency of operations, among other factors. Rather, the trustees concurred with their predecessors on previous boards and wanted to unlock the congregation's full potential by developing a vision for the church, along with strategies, goals and clear plans. It's difficult to focus on the big picture and First UU's future, when the board is forced to spend inordinate amounts of time on such administrative matters as whether to buy a wheelbarrow.

Armed with a comprehensive report and "road map" developed by a task force led by trustee, Phil Hastings, as well as the congregation's important approval of a budget funding the new administrative position, the Board of Trustees put into motion steps to hire an executive director. Last spring, then-President Mark Kilpatrick appointed a Search Committee (Karen Neeley, chair, Don Smith, Luther Elmore, Eric Stimmel and Kae McLaughlin) to find and screen candidates for the position. On Aug. 2, final interviews were conducted and then on Aug. 5, under the leadership of current President Sheila Gladstone, the Board of Trustees extended an offer to the favorite candidate.

Sean comes to the position with 10 years of nonprofit administrative experience in Austin, including the transformation of a fly-by-the-seat-of-your-pants operation into a professional, financially secure, solid organization. He also shares the values of our church community. As he wrote in applying for the position of executive director, "I look forward to joining a team of staff and members who passionately implement the First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin's mission and vision, strengthen a vibrant community, find spiritual growth and enrich the Austin area in general."

Now a month into his new role, Sean has embraced the First UU community and offers high praise for its accomplishments, both by staff and volunteers. "Something special is happening here," he says of First UU. "The experts have told us that they've never seen a church this size with a staff so small. By all rights, things should be falling apart and people should be at each other's throats. But instead, I've found a community of hard-working, talented people who have built a strong, healthy church. What's more, I see the congregation eager to take on newer, bigger challenges that will build our minds, inspire our spirits and enrich our community. When I think about all that First UU already has achieved and grown in the last five years, it fills me with hope and excitement. I look forward to helping the congregation tap all the tremendous potential here."

Board leaders have stressed that adding an executive director will not supplant First UU's need for volunteers. Sitting in his new office, recently painted by First UU volunteers, Sean agrees. "We'll probably have a greater need for volunteers because there are so many things we as a congregation want to do," he says. "I just make sure we've got gas in the car, a map, air in the tires — and that everyone has a sack lunch." His job, and that of the office staff, is to "help volunteers use best practices and to maximize their talents," Sean says. "The key is how this position helps us as a community achieve our goals and realize our dreams."

The staff also will work to maintain the "institutional memory" required in ongoing, large organizations, he says, "to help committees' work continue despite changes in leadership." He also hopes to help develop a leadership base in First UU and then help match people and their skills with First UU's volunteer needs.

Echoing comments by the current board president, Sean cautions that he's in no position at this point to take on congregants' pet projects. "The board has given me very specific marching orders that will carry us through the next year," Sean says. "The board and I want to tap into that great energy of the congregation but right now the priority is to make sure we have a solid foundation to build upon."

Expectations for him are:

- Short term (first 3 months) Orientation and learning about the First UU community: our procedures, systems and policies, but more importantly learning about the staff, leaders and volunteers' activities.
- Medium term (3 to 18 months) Improving various processes, procedures and policies that are necessary to manage First UU's current size and its future growth.
- Long term (beyond 18 months) Work with the Board of Trustees, the senior minister and the congregation to unlock our potential as a church, supporting volunteers and staff in building a stronger community presence, social action, religious education and other programs, as well as to help usher in better facilities.

Succeeding in achieving these goals, Sean says, is made easier by the quality and commitment of not only First UU's volunteers but also the office staff he oversees. "Each of our staff has made a wonderful impression," he says. "Each brings many special skills and experience to their jobs."

Sean calls Office Manager Dotti Sizer the "central hub" of First UU's office operation. "It's hard to know how she's able to do a thousand different things during the week, but she does," he says with amazement. "Many don't see these accomplishments, but they're vital to the smooth operation of the church." He adds, "She brings great warmth, trust and love to the job. Everyone who deals with her knows they are valued, respected and listened to, both in joys and sorrows."

Sean, whose work with the Foundation for Self-Sufficiency included extensive experience with financial matters, also had praise for bookkeeper Jim Scott. "Jim brings many years of high-level, professional experience to his job with First UU," Sean says. "I look forward to working with him and treasurer Luther Elmore to build on the hard work that so many volunteers have done to give First UU financial success and strength and prepare us for the big projects that lie ahead."

Linda Taylor drew kudos for her work on the church's newsletter and e-mail notices. "Linda has impressed me with her initiative and excitement to develop and professionalize our newsletter and other communications," Sean says. "I think we can expect great things in those departments in the coming year." Smiling, he adds, "She's also found ways to save money."

John Sanders was commended for his work, too. "John has earned the trust and respect of this congregation in a very deep and profound way," Sean says. "Everyone I've talked to praises his work as sexton. In a nutshell, everyone sleeps soundly when it comes to the church being locked up and secure at night. "John's thorough attention to detail and strong loyalty to the church leave no doubt that every door has been locked, every window closed and every other point of security reviewed. We are certainly in his debt."

Another who does a lot for the church, Sean says, is Ron Phares, who silently carries out important tasks like a bassist does in a band. By all accounts, he does courteous, conscientious work in every area that he's responsible for: overseeing the youth group, coordinating the events team, managing coffee hour after the Sunday service, and more. That he can make time in his busy student schedule to all these things well shows real commitment."

For his part, Sean plans to be there for our church community, too — quiet in the background, plucking the right notes, helping us keep the beat so that First UU exudes noble qualities, like those of great music.

Hale's no stranger to First UU

Sean Hale, the new executive director of First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin, comes to the job having some familiarity with his new employer.

After all, he and his wife, Diana Miranda Murillo, were married in the church Aug. 16, 2003. They also had attended some worship services as well as Voyagers events.

In recent months, before the job possibility arose, they had been looking at First UU as a possible spiritual home as they prepared for the birth of their first child, due Dec. 8. Already knowing the



baby's gender, they plan to name her Daniella Lucia. Both were raised as Catholics — Diana in her native Costa Rica, and Louisiana-born Sean in Idaho — but were seeking a church more in tune with their beliefs today. They found First UU to be comfortable as a place to worship and raise children — "a serendipitous experience," Sean says. Though they have attended some services since Sean became executive director, it remains to be seen whether they join the church. They're undecided about whether it'd be right for them and the church, considering his new new professional role with First UU. "If a member, how do I come to church and be just 'a person in the audience?" "he wonders aloud.

Sean attended the University of Texas at Austin, receiving his Certificate in Management of Nonprofit Organizations in 2006 and Master of Arts in Latin American Studies, with a concentration in 20th-century history and minor in sustainable development, in 2000. He received his BA in history and Spanish from Bellarmine University in Louisville, Ky., in 1997. In addition to graduating summa cum laude from Bellarmine, his honors include Foreign Language and Area Studies Fellowship, in Portuguese, 1998-99; Ford Foundation Social Science Concepts and Area Studies Research Grant, summer 1999; Tinker Foundation Field Research Grant, spring 1999; and Cambridge University Summer History Program Scholarship, 1995.

Sean and Diana met in Austin when she came here for training. She obtained her master's degree in library science from UT-Austin, adding that to two bachelor's degrees and a special academic degree obtained in Costa Rica, all in library science. They have what he calls "an unusually large collection of movies and music. The latter comes as no surprise when you learn of his long interest in music, from rock to folk and country to pop. He's plays guitar and bass, even a little mandolin, and used to play trumpet and violin ("but it's been years," he says).

T o make room for the new baby, he's sold off the last of his electric guitar equipment. "I figure it'll be 20 years before I have time to use it much again," Sean says. "But I've kept my Martin acoustic guitar. It's a beaut' — great sound."

Outside music and movies, Sean's hobbies include beer brewing, gardening, etymology (word origins) and linguistics in English, Spanish and "Spanglish," and board games, especially those like Risk that involve strategy.
