January is Paradox Players Season Ticket Time





Did you know that June Beach used to run competitively, placing in a number of races and even completing a 13 mile half-marathon? And that she still gets up at 4 AM to work out five or six days a week? Maybe that helps to explain how she gets it all done.

June volunteers weekly at the People's Community Clinic in the Medical Records Department. She purges old medical records, makes entries in the computer and boxes the records for storage. One Tuesday a month, she volunteers with a group of other church members putting together educational materials for PCC's patients. This is not her only volunteer gig. She is at the Volunteer Health Clinic one evening a

month, logging in patients and pulling their medical records. You may have seen her in the church office every Thursday afternoon. Typically, she copies the Sunday Order of Service and Sunday Bulletin and pulls the large print and Braille music for the service. She is also the contact person for the Mind and Meaning Book Club which meets every Sunday morning. But we're not done yet; from December through April she volunteers with AARP to prepare income tax returns.

June retired ten years ago after working most of her career in health insurance with Blue Cross/Shield and then with TX Medicaid. After growing up in Kansas, she and her husband have lived mostly in Texas where they raised their two boys. She has been a member of FUUCA for five years.

Sandwiched in between all her volunteer hours, June enjoys reading and sewing. She is currently working on a quilt for her oldest son. But her most treasured interest is her two grandchildren, ages 3 & 4. They live in Houston and come to visit most weekends. Making pancakes together on Saturday mornings is a favorite activity. We claim that we wish a diversity of opinions and then when we disagree about major situations like the performance of the minister we seemed to very quickly fall out of right relationship with each other. movement because "we want to be around people that think like we do." When a point of disagreement comes up in our community then our relationship with each other can quickly sour.

Being around people who have the same opinions as me is certainly comfortable and supportive but only limited growth can occur in such circumstances. I believe we grow when in community with people who challenge us and are willing to stay in relationship with us as we differ and we grow spiritually through the challenge. Our duty as members of this religious community is to hold each other accountable for our actions, values and opinions by calling us to embody our religious values. I believe Davidson attempted to hold us accountable for our values through his sermons. I believe the board felt responsible to hold ministerial leadership accountable to our higher values. Many members of our congregation also attempted to hold all our leadership accountable to values of fairness and openness. These were all good aspects of what happened in the last few weeks. The failure I see is where we fell out of love, respect, and compassion with those we disagree with or were in conflict with. The turmoil surrounding the congregational vote to dismiss Davidson has injured the soul of our religious community. I believe we lost touch with values of trust, honesty and respect for others in the last few weeks. This is shown as many valuable members have chosen to leave our community. The pain is great for all of us.

The hope I find is not that our values failed us but we failed to live up to our values. We failed to stay in relationship with those we disagree with. I have had many people on all sides of the issues talk to me trying to find meaning in what happened and seek to understand their pain. The need to fellowship with those who share our view is understandable and needed. Also to move forward I believe each of us could benefit from getting fellowship of those with differing opinions and listen to them. Hopefully if we listen to them they will reciprocate by listening to us. We will hear why people with similar information as us believed and acted differently than we did. Perhaps, just perhaps, we may understand most of us were acting in what we believed to be the common good for our religious community. Out of this may grow that seed of respect and though this is not quite the same as loving those who think differently from us, it has the potential to grow there. And at least we will be back in right relationship with others and moving forward. I wish us all well on this journey.

On that day, more than one person likened our situation to a divorce. When it comes to the pain, turmoil, uncertainty, and hurt that so many of us feel, the comparison seems spot on.

As the night went on, I witnessed a phenomenon that gives me hope for our future. Each speaker, whether pro or con, received loud applause. This shows that people listened to each other and respected the other's viewpoint and feelings, even if they didn't agree. This level of understanding and goodwill transcended the evening's difficult and sometimes divisive subject matter. Our love and care for one another form the primary ingredients for us moving forward.

We will spend the coming weeks asking, then answering, "what now?" and "what next?" If the journey of a thousand miles begins with one small step, then I propose that we begin by saying "hi." Our success depends, at least in part, on the strength of our bonds of friend-ship and community, so the more we know each other the better. In a church our size, I bet that no single person knows everyone else, but that doesn't mean we can't do better.

So, when we're here in this sacred place, lets make a point of introducing ourselves to at least one new person. Its as simple as extending your right hand and saying "Hi, I'm Sean Hale, have we met before?"

Office Update. As many of you know, the 2009 budget does not fund the Office Manager position, which Dotti Sizer held for the last three years. Her last day was December 12th. As these are unusually busy times for us, we may not always respond as quickly as we would like. We do some prioritization to handle urgent matters, and otherwise will get back to people in the order we receive your inquiries. I apologize in advance for any inconvenience and look forward to getting back up to speed so we can fully serve this community.

Split the Plate

On January 4, our split-the-plate beneficiary is the International Convocation of **UU Women**. The first international meeting of UU women in February 2009 in Houston will weave global partnerships to enrich women's lives. Sponsored by Southwest Unitarian Universalist Women, a nonprofit organization, the convocation will enable women from Asia, Africa, Europe, and the Americas to share their stories, learn from each other, motivate each other, inspire and support emerging leaders, form lasting collaborations to improve women's lives, and celebrate together. Split-the-plate funding will help women of diverse backgrounds and limited resources with their travel expenses.

On January 18, we split the offertory plate with Front Steps, the nonprofit organization that coordinates the local coldweather shelter program, the sack-lunch program, and a cafeteria for the homelessall of which are programs in which our church participates. Front Steps operates in the facility known as the Austin Resource Center for the Homeless (ARCH), providing year-round assistance downtown, including 100 beds for the homeless. Services include transportation to shelters at participating churches, distributing blankets, and donated food and lunches to the working homeless. Churches, including First UU, provide food and space to house the increased number of homeless single men seeking shelter on "freeze nights." We also make lunches once a week for the working homeless (sacklunch program) and provide volunteer teams to serve meals at the ARCH cafeteria yearround.







Dear Members of First Unitarian-Universalist Church of Austin,

Our congregation met Saturday, December 13, and after hours of discussion voted to dismiss Dr. Davidson Loehr as Senior Minister of First UU. Of the 636 members eligible to vote on this emotionally painful matter, 408 — or 64 percent — took part in this decision. As tallied by our UUA moderator, as well as representatives of First UU's Committee on Ministries and other close observers, the official vote was 213 to "dismiss" and 176 to "retain" the Senior Minister, or 55 percent to 45 percent. There also were 19 abstentions, with ballots unmarked for either choice or not placed into the box at all.

Moving forward with the transition in the coming weeks, the Board of Trustees of First UU recognizes Dr. Loehr's desire for closure and intends to work with him to identify opportunities that will help in that regard as he and the congregation make this sad, painful transition. The Board of Trustees is committed to working closely with a UUA team to negotiate Dr. Loehr's terms of departure, while showing compassion to a man who has energetically and passionately served our church for the past eight years. We are also working with the UUA Transitions office to bring in a qualified interim minister skilled in addressing the particular challenges we now face.

Recognizing how difficult this has been for the congregation — regardless of on which side of the matter a member stood — the Board of Trustees realizes the clear need for efforts to help each of us, as individuals and as a community, to heal from the hurt felt in the aftermath of this decision. This is true for the congregation as well as the staff. Consequently, efforts have begun to identify resources and processes that can be tapped into and instituted during the coming weeks and months. We will keep you informed about developments.

We understand and respect the feelings expressed during the past weeks, and we have heard and read the broad spectrum of reactions to the outcome. We pledge to do all we can to work with other church leaders, congregation members and groups within First UU to fix the broken heart of and division within our church community.

The vote December 13 was not the end of this process; it was just the beginning, as now the hard work really starts. We encourage each of you to join together, as a community, and to reach out to one another, helping to heal the wounds.

We urge you to bring forth your ideas, energy and commitment, joining together in what will be an arduous journey

- but one filled with opportunity for growth, as individuals and a church community. Sincerely,

Sunday Worship Services 9:45 and 11:30

January 4: Hope. Rev. Kathleen Ellis. Minister at Live Oak Unitarian Universalist Church.

January 11: <u>The Seven Deadly UU Sins.</u> Rev. Bret Lortie, First UU Church of San Antonio. What are the seven sins, or negative actions against one another and Nature, that a liberal religious tradition is most challenged to address? After much futzing with the original deadly ones, one finds that as categories, they aren't bad—just badly in need of reinterpretation through a Unitarian Universalist lens.

January 18: <u>Disembodied Dreams: What is the Sound of One UU Practicing?</u>: Ron Phares, Seminary Student at Presbyterian Theological Seminary. Martin Luther King Jr. & Barak Obama respectively represent a Dream and the Embodiment (though not the entire realization of) that dream. This is a political and cultural example of how dreaming prepares us for embodiment. That being said, embodiment is itself not an end but a continuing means. It literally changes the machinations of our brains and patterns of our lives. Unitarian Universalism is a very good dream. But dreams need bodies to be realized. How can we - or how do we - embody our values and our spirit? Where and how can we do this better?

January 25: Opinion Industries and the Community of Faith Preacher. Rev. Eliza Galaher of the Wildflower Church in Austin. Rev. Eliza Galaher will explore the role of the church in calling us back from what Unitarian theologian James Luther Adams called "opinion industries" to the community and *communication* of faith.

February 1: How is wisdom different than intelligence? Eric Hepburn. What role should wisdom play in governing the application and use of our intellect? This sermon will take a look at means-ends rationality as an example of applied intelligence and ask questions about how a wisdom concept like karma can be understood as a way of framing, focusing, and managing means-ends thinking to avoid the trap of unintended consequences.

Public Affairs Forum: Sundays—11:30 a.m. Howson Hall

January 4 Speaker Race and the Upcoming TX Legislative Session. Speaker: Prof. Sherri Greenberg, LBJ School of Public Affairs. The biennial TX Legislative session begins with the Speaker of the House election on Tuesday, January 13th, 2009. The present TX House Speaker, Tom Craddick, is challenged by a number of opponents. Greenberg will share her thoughts on the speaker's race as well as the upcoming 2009 TX Legislative Session. Sherri Greenberg served as a member of the Texas House of Representatives for 10 years.

January 11 A Botanical Garden for Austin: Why Austin needs an independent, non-profit Botanical Garden. Speaker: Dr. Craig Nazor, Professor. As Austin continues to grow, there is need for a facility to help Austin focus on what this means to our rapidly disappearing plant communities both in Austin and around the world. Dr. Nazor will explore the arguments for a botanical garden independent of the city, state, and university. Throughout his life, Dr. Nazor has nurtured a keen interest in the natural world. In 2000, he was hired by the Hartman Foundation to design and install the plantings for the Hartman Prehistoric Garden at Zilker Botanical Gardens. 

Children's Religious Education: What are they learning about!

Children in Kindergarten through Second grades studied the "Special Times" curricula and focused on our Jewish Heritage. They studied many of the different Jewish Holidays and the spiritual reasons they are celebrated. They read stories from the Torah that are told during the different holidays to understand that these "fun" celebrations have a deep spiritual significance for people.
