In the Interim by Janet Newman, your Interim Minister

Recently I have been preaching on the topic of covenant, or mutual promise, and I have encouraged the entire congregation to take up the process of creating a relational covenant of behavior. Indeed, the column about the middle school covenant in last month's newsletter offers inspiration for all ages.

As it happens, it is often more effective to create a system of mutual promises in smaller groups where people are together frequently than it is to develop a congregational system of promises first and expect smaller groups to follow suit. And so I urge all committee chairs, small group facilitators, task force leaders, and anyone who gathers a working group here at the church to develop a covenant of right relation. I would very much like to be your guide in the process. If you put me on the agenda

(and let me know about it!) I can work with you to create the basics of your group's covenant in short order. Then you can refine it, wordsmith it, whatever it needs from that point.

My hope is that once you have experience with the process of developing a covenant in smaller gatherings, congregants will find it less daunting to develop a congregational covenant of right relation. I have many examples of systems of mutual promise (covenant) from other congregations; you can see them on the UUA.org website. Bridge Builders put this process right up there with the other recommendations. Why not make it happen this year? See you in church, *Janet Newman, your interim minister*

The Transition Team and The Interim Period

I am very pleased to announce the names of the volunteers on the Transition Team for 2009-10. These persons were selected and approved by the Board of Trustees and have shown great promise as the Lay "Think Tank" for the

congregation. They are Nancy Bene, Jim Burson, Margaret Roberts, Michael Kersey, Wendy Kuo, Sharon Moore, and Sylvia Pope. At their first meeting with me, they decided that the Congregational Time-Line project should be the initial task of Interim Ministry this fall.

The purpose of the Time-Line is to elicit comments from congregants on church events that caused individuals to feel proud of First UU or to feel disappointed in First UU. Sometimes the same event elicits both responses, and this is completely normal. The result of the exercise is to show patterns in response to church events, to learn from one another, and to give me some insights into congregational history and reactions. Please participate. The Process of creating a Covenant in a Small Group. When the Open Minds covenant group started meeting, what held us together initially was a desire to be there. We quickly set about defining our covenant, or contract with each other. At first, it was easiest to talk about what we didn't want or what hadn't worked before. Our first real agreement was that we would define ourselves in the positive, by who we are (or at least who we wanted to be).

There was the usual tension between process and progress. We were all wary of repetitive meetings with seemingly no conclusion, yet we wanted to give ourselves time to explore shared values. We used an Affinity Diagram, a brainstorming tool, where each participant writes down as many uncensored ideas as they can think of on cards. The cards are placed on a wall and similar ideas are moved next to each other to form clusters of commonality. The group reviews and prioritizes the ideas. After some weeks of discussion, Carol Ramsey, took our ideas and gave them voice in the form of the group prayer:

As we light the chalice, as we hold hands, as we breathe deep and slow down

Let us remember what brings us together
May we choose compassion even when it isn't easy
May we tell good stories more often than bad
May we listen to each other and support each other
May we look outside of ourselves and be open to what lays beyond
onally creating the life we want in the every day moments, with our e

May we live intentionally, creating the life we want, in the every day moments, with our every day choices May we be grateful for our time together.

This is the agreement we've made between ourselves. Though it at times feels like that prayer reflects our aspirations more than our daily lives, for at least an hour each week we get together and reaffirm our intention to slow down, to support each other, to create the lives we want, to be open and grateful. by Brian Wittenbrook

Day of the Dead sounds so funereal to our ears, and yet our cousins to the south find the holiday to be one of connection and growth. How can we learn from them? All are invited to bring mementos of deceased loved ones to church for an altar.

Sunday, October 4:- Joanne Richards, Lilith Fund Board of Directors and Mike Hirsch, NARAL ProChoice Texas Board Member "What is the State of Women's Reproductive Health in Texas?" Texas ranks the highest state in the country in teenage births, while also ranked 1st in abstinence-only sex education funding. Something is very wrong here in our great state. This is the sad state of affairs in TX. Joanne Richards, of the Lilith Fund Board of Directors and Mike Hirsch, Board Member of NARAL ProChoice Texas and also member of the Lilith Fund Board of Directors will join us for a thought-provoking presentation on the State of Women's Reproductive Health in TX.

Sunday, October 11: Michael Mordecai, Jazz Trombonist, member of legendary Beto and the Fairlanes "History and Fundamentals of the Music Business in the Live Music Capitol!" Sunday, October 18: Texas Senator Kirk Watson, "Eleven TX State Constitutional Amendments; How Will You Vote on Nov. 3rd"? Did you know there are 11 TX State Constitutional Amendments that Texas registered voters have an opportunity to vote on Nov. 3rd? What are these amendments? How are you going to vote on them? Join the Austin League of Women Voters and the Public Affairs Forum of Austin as we team-up to host a forum to answer questions about these 11 amendments. - 3. Feature the good work of your group as the program on one night.



Split the Plate for October

On the first and third Sundays of each month we split the non-pledge offertory plate with a nonprofit organization, chosen by the congregation, that puts our common social-justice values into action.



On October 4, our split-the-plate beneficiary will be Austin SafePlace, which provides shelter and counseling to women, men, ace and children suffering from the harmful effects of domestic violence. Each year roughly 1,000

individuals receive shelter at SafePlace. The organization provides not only crisis services but also long-term support, including counseling, life-skill training, parenting classes, and housing placement. Also part of the SafePlace mission is community education on sexual and domestic violence.

On October 18, we split the plate with the Unitarian Universalists United Nations Office-Ghana Project. The mission of UU-UNO is "empowering Unitarian Universalists to participate in the UN's work to build a

just international community." The Ghana Project ("Every Child is Our Child") grew out of the desire to do something about AIDS in Africa. Education is the most important factor in slowing the spread of AIDS. For \$80, school fees, books, and uniforms can be provided to send a child to school for one year. With \$800, a child can be assured of a full primary and secondary education.

Social Action's Sack Lunch Program for the Working Homeless

Every Monday night a team meets to make 30 sack lunches and deliver them to Austin Resource Center for the Homeless, "ARCH", 500 E. 7th St. Each team provides its own bread, fruit, lunchmeat and cheese for the lunches, while the rest is bought in bulk and stored at the church for use by all the teams. For a half an hour the kitchen is buzzing as the team lines up the sacks, makes the sandwiches and stuffs the bags with fruit, and other goodies. Next we load them in a car, drive them to ARCH and 30 homeless folks who have jobs now have lunch! All teams meet in the church kitchen except for the 2nd Monday team. They meet at a home in south Austin and have a potluck supper along with the sacking. Religious Education Covenant Ritual

On Sunday, September 20, our Interim Minister, Janet Newman, and our Director of Religious Education, Lara Douglass, presented a Religious Education Covenant Ritual during the children's story time for both services. This beautiful and deeply important covenant was a composite of material gathered from a variety of Unitarian Universalist religious education sources.

Here is a transcript of the ritual.

DRE: Teachers, the objective of this teaching ministry is that you will nurture, challenge and mentor: engaging in the lifelong process of religious education. Our children and youth, with you and in your care, will integrate wisdom from many sources with present experience and reality. With you, they will develop deeper knowledge of what is good, and right and true. Do you pledge to give of yourselves for the spiritual and moral growth of our young people?

Teachers: We do.

Minister: This is a high calling. We are grateful to you for your willingness to assume this responsibility.

DRE: Children and youth, it is a joy to share with you the faith tradition of Unitarian Universalistm Do you pledge to attend class--with open minds, helping hands and loving hearts--making this a place of education, fun, and friendships?

Children & Youth: We do.

Minister: We are all partners in the concern for spiritual growth. Do you, the congregation of First UU Church of Austin, pledge to contribute to the Religious Education process through the example of living our UU principles, developing relationships with the young people of our church, and giving support the Religious Education program?

Congregation: We do.

Minister: In this shared journey of religious education and exploration, we join in common purpose to dedicate and covenant with this program and these volunteers. Thank you for taking on this important ministry.

Through this covenant, the congregation has promised their support and partnership with the RE Department. Having made these promises we would ask that you consider where you could be helpful in assisting RE today. We are very excited to have a record number of children in RE at this time and we need volunteers in the classroom every single Sunday. It takes 7 volunteers every Sunday for each teacher to have an assistant in the classroom. Without a volunteer many of our teachers are left alone with 15 or more children per class. Our Child Safety Policy mandates that we have 2 adults in the classroom at all times.

Please volunteer today so we can continue to have such a vibrant and well attended RE program available to our religious community. There is no preparation you need to do. As a volunteer you can be as active as you choose, feel free to observe or jump right in the fun and do some arts and crafts with our children.

Teacher Development & Training



In August and September, Religious Education teachers and staff attended two different training classes at the First UU Church in San Antonio. Both events were educational, enlightening and very valuable for staff enrichment and skills development.

The first, a Youth Advisor Training, on August 15, was attended by Cyndi Stein, Children's Programming Assistant, and Scott Butki, Youth Advisor and Middle School teacher. The training was lead by Donna Harrison, a senior youth advisor for five years at the district level and last year's Youth Advisor of the Year for the Southwest UU Conference. Donna covered a variety of topics including; youth empowerment, community building, balanced programming and the importance of congregational involvement. The training also covered many techniques to get youth be more open with each other and build lasting bonds. The staff came back from the event with renewed energy and commitment to our youth.

Similarly, Cyndi and Scott, this time joined by teacher Adriana DeLaRosa, learned a lot during a one day *Involve* training titled "Radical Hospitality: Creating Beloved Community for All Children." The Workshop leader Sally Patton, Ed. M. Developmental Psychology authored "Welcoming Children with Special Needs." The workshop covered topics such as assessment methods, teaching strategies, sensitivity training and hands-on training activities.

Our staff gained a lot of insight on working with children with a variety of special needs and how they can best be accommodated and welcomed into our religious education community.

In her book "Welcoming Children with Special Needs," Sally discusses the 'giftedness paradigm.'

"In the giftedness paradigm, every person is seen as unique and therefore all their differences are seen as normal. We can adopt the giftedness paradigm in our faith communities, nurturing the innate spirituality of children, recognizing differences as opportunities for meaningful interaction, weaving all children into the fabric of our church communities, embracing social justice issues related to special needs, and offering a sanctuary in which children are safe and free to explore who they are."

Everyone who attended the workshop left having a better appreciation for the challenges students with special needs have and a stronger resolution to make their time in religious education a more positive and inclusive experience. In essence; to engage, to listen, to teach and truly experience each child from our hearts.

Youth Activities: Middle School

This has been a month of transition for the middle school class as **we finished our summer curriculum of social action and started our fall curriculum called Neighboring Faiths**. This is a great curriculum where the class spends about one month talking about different faiths and, during that month, takes a field trip to that place of worship. First we are laying the groundwork with activities and discussions the students talk about such questions as **"If I founded my own religion...." or "If I started my own ritual..."**

Meanwhile, as new students join the class or students returned after the summer break, we go over our new covenant with them and it's great to sometimes see the students, instead of just the teacher, be the one explaining to them the rules of the road. by Scott Bukti

Beginning of the Year Lock-In.

This is traditionally the time for new


