

In the Interim by Janet Newman

The theme of last month's sermons, everything you ever wanted to know about ministry, was intended to get congregants thinking about the path ahead that leads to calling a settled minister.

In April, the Interim Minister Task Force will take on the task of applying for an Interim Minister for 2010-2011 and finding that person. When I attend the continuing education conference for Accredited Interim Ministers in mid-April, I plan to speak very highly of First UU and recommend that all of the participants pay attention to this congregation. I'm sure you'll have plenty of applicants for the position.

Meanwhile, plans are afoot to send a First UU team to the General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association in order to bring back information, wisdom, and opportunities that can benefit the church.

The team is developing a strategy to make the most of General Assembly. Some goals include finding stewardship resources, developing peer networks (especially for executive staff and church officers), forging a stronger connection to the UUA and the liberal movement, creating a positive buzz about First UU, and finding resources to help in the ongoing implementation of the Bridge Builder Action Plan.

Regretfully, this year's church budget does not provide finances to help send people to G.A. So the team, composed of executive staff and church officers, is appealing to the congregation to donate frequent flyer miles and gifts of cash so that support is available to those on the team who cannot dedicate personal resources to attend. The checks for the GA team should be made out to the First UU Church and in the memo it should say "for GA." These checks will be entered into the Minister's Discretionary Account and will enable elected leaders and staff to go to the General Assembly. Expenses for General Assembly include transportation to Minneapolis, registration (\$310) per person, lodging (\$150 per night per room) and meals. April 1: Mary Gordon Spence, Writer, Commentator, Storyteller "Finding Magic in the Mundane"

Austin humorlosopher (Mary made up that word) had an epiphany during a recent funeral service. She decided to celebrate all the paradoxes in life rather than trying to resolve them. Mary Gordon is always on the lookout for magic amid the mundane. As a writer, commentator and storyteller, she regales her audiences with that magic. A master of diversity, Mary Gordon has taught school—from kindergarten to college, lived in Latin America, worked for a former US president and always keeps her television volume on an even number. She delivers engaging presentations around the nation. She writes a regular column for the Austin American Statesman (that appears irregularly), provides commentary for KUT Radio, and is working on her second book. Get ready to be entertained and stimulated by Austin author and master storyteller Mary Gordon Spence.

April 18: "Reinventing the Energy Delivery System" Brewster McCracken, former Austin City Council
Member and now the Executive Director of the Pecan Street Project, will share this exciting adventure in community-wide
collaboration to establish Austin as America's Clean Energy Laboratory and fully re-invent the energy delivery system. The
Pecan Street Project is an ambitious effort to empower customers and innovators to use the energy system in new ways
while making energy cleaner, water usage more efficient, and the economy stronger.

April 25: "The Middle East: Poetry and Politics," Fady Joudah, Palestinian Poet, Translator, and Physician. Fady Joudah was born in Austin, Texas in a Palestinian refugee home. He is a physician of internal medicine in Houston and a field member of Doctors Without Borders. He is also a world class translator and poet. He is well published in the field of medicine. He has held posts in Darfur and Zambia. His literary works have appeared in several journals and anthologies. His translation of Mahmoud Darwish's most recent poetry is in the Butterfly's Burden from Copper Canyon Press. He is the recipient of the Yale Series for Younger Poets Award for 2007 (the first Arab American to be awarded the prize); he was finalist for ForeWord magazine poetry book of the year in 2008. Dr. Joudah will speak on the Middle East and how his experiences have shaped his careers in medicine and poetry. Please welcome this outstanding native son of Austin.

Interim Minister Task Force is Meeting and the Search is Underway

The Interim Minister Search process is underway and will seek input from the Board and the Congregation. Five capable and energetic volunteers have been gathered to assemble our church's application for an interim minister for the second of a planned two-year interim period. The volunteers on the Interim Task Force reflect a wide variety of experience at First UU and in their professional lives. Gillian Redfearn was elected by the group as its chair. She is a parent, long time member and former Religious Education teacher. Nancy Bene served as a member of the Interim search team last year and is a member of Rev. Janet Newman's Interim Transition Team. Kae McLaughlin is one of the most visible members of the group. She's a former congregational (temple) administrator, active with several current First UU committees and has hands' on experience with Policy Style Governance. Ken Pfluger and Brian Miller are both parents and members of the Men's Fellowship Breakfast. Ken participated in Bridgebuilders and Brian has worked with the Finance Committee. Michael West, Board Trustee is the Board's liaison to the Task Force.

The Task Force has held their first full meeting and received an overview of the Interim Search process as conducted within the framework of the UUA Transitions program. The Task Force will seek some in put from the congregation in order to communicate the considerable progress we at First UU Austin have made over the past year. As part of the UUA guidelines, the chosen Interim minister will not be a candidate for our called minister. The Task Force understands that while this task is not the same as that of selecting a candidate for a called minister, it is extremely important in the life and transition of this church.

In terms of timing, the Task Force is working on the Interim Application and plans to submit it to the UUA Transitions Office by mid-April. The Transitions office is the clearinghouse for congregations seeking an Interim Minister and for ministers seeking an Interim position. The Task Force will begin to review the available candidates as soon as late April according to John Weston of UUA. The Task Force will review the qualifications and references of the candidates and make a recommendation of their choice to the Board. The Board of Trustees will contract with the selected candidate to begin at the church around September 1st. A wide variety of resources on the transition process are available on the UUA.org website. The Task Force looks forward to their work and the successful completion of a second year of interim ministry. Michael West, Board of Trustees

- Must sign the membership book at least 30 days before a congregational meeting. Currently, the Membership book is available for signing in the Gallery on the second and fourth Sundays of each month. The last signing opportunity before the deadline is Sunday, April 11.
- 2) Make a "contribution of record" at least 30 days prior to a congregational meeting. A contribution of record includes pledge payments and other recorded contributions. Settled Ministry Search is Underway

First UU Austin is embarking on the long-anticipated search for its next Settled Minister. The journey will take a yearlong path of inquiry and engage the entire congregation. One of the first critical steps is the selection of a Settled Ministry Search Committee. According to the 1st UU By-Laws, the Settled Ministry Search Committee is selected by your Board of Trustees. The Board has asked trustee, Michael West, to oversee that selection.

On Sunday March 14, First UU hosted the Rev. Kathleen Ellis in her role of Ministerial Settlement Representative for the Southwestern District of the UUA. Her sermon addressed the responsibilities of our congregation as we look toward calling a settled minister after two years of guiding interim ministry. After

the two services, she provided a more in-depth overview of the process overall, the kinds of persons best suited to the tasks at hand and the level of commitment required to successfully carry out the responsibilities of the Search Committee. She pointed out that the best candidates for the Search Committee are those members whose overall perspective and demonstrated commitment is to the nature, purpose and activities of our church community. Contrary to what might be expected, she does not recommend that the Search Committee be made up of representatives of special interests within the church. The top two characteristics on her list of the kind of persons to seek include:

- One who is committed to UU pluralism in every area: theology, life styles, and social concern.
- One who is patiently able to work for consensus rather than insisting upon majority rule or minority tyranny.
 The persons chosen will have a demonstrated commitment of time and energy and have the evident confidence of our Congregation.

Quite aside from the requirements of goodwill and emotional and spiritual energy, Rev. Ellis pointed out that it is not unusual for members of the Search Committee to devote some 400 or more hours to the search process over the next year.



NUTS and BOLTS The nuts-and-bolts of Stewardship over the next few months will include helping our members keep on top of their Pledge commitments. Our members – you, we – made our Pledges willingly and freely. In the past, it has often fallen to our members themselves to remember to make their own payments. Our Church has made the process of paying easier over the years though the options of automatic bank drafts and scheduled credit card transfers. Still and all, our Church has found that credit cards require such maintenance as updating the expiration dates. Further, payments by check-in-the-mail or into the Sunday plate are sometimes easy to overlook. The Stewardship committee will begin with the simplest of reminders – the reminder of the dollar amount of your pledge for 2010, and the amount paid through the date of the report. 



The movie will be shown at 7 p.m. on April 23. The documentary is about the fundamental questions: Is there a God? What does historical evidence say? We'll get into a good ol' debate about athiests and other skeptics. Great Activites in the Junior and Senior High Programs

The Middle School and High School Religious Education classes are learning about Islam. They have had guest speakers who explained to them what it is like to a muslim and a media potrayal separating what many think they know about Islam from what their holy book actually says. The last Sunday in March they attended a prayer service, to which they were invited by the interfaith group which made the video presentation.

The classes also discussed the first two UU principals: The inherent worth and dignity of every person; Justice, equity and compassion in human relations. With this discussion we spoke of cults and what to watch out for regarding them. The consensus of the students was that the most difficult of the UU principals to follow are the first two, showing compassion to others especially when someone is acting, in their words, like jerks or bullies. This matches my own experience when discussing the principals with adults. Put simply it is hard to treat someone with compassion and dignity when that person is not showing compassion and being quite rude. It was a good discussion, as I would ask each of them to explain in their own words what they felt each principal was all about.

Some of the high school students will be attending a youth rally in Dallas the weekend of April 11-12.

Separately in San Antonio, but the same weekend, some of the middle school students will be attending a new event I have helped organize and promote, at the behest of the district: An event for middle school students throughout our district. This will be an overnight event similar to the lock-ins we have periodically for the high schoolers.

A rally is when students from throughout our church district get together for a weekend and have a wide variety of activities ranging from a worship service to a social action event to a dance and talent show. A "lock-in" is when students stay in a building and do activities together, from board games to watching a movie to just talking. Both events are, essentially, about community and seem to result in better relations, and more empathy, among members.

I will report back in the next newsletter on how those events went. Meanwhile, we need volunteers to attend both events so if available to attend and/or drive please email me.

Meanwhile, the classes are going great as the students are learning about what all the religions we have looked at have in common, particularly the importance and value of family, community and love. We will have time for examining one or two more religions after islam but we have not picked which those will be.
