

Spotlight on... Camp Fire Club & **Andrew Young!**

When I introduce myself as the leader of a Camp Fire club, I find that most people have either never heard of Camp Fire, or remember it by its original name "Campfire Girls". I can relate to them. Growing up in San Antonio, everyone knew what it meant to be a Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Brownie, or Girl Scout, but no one knew what Camp

Fire was. Although Camp Fire USA began in 1910 as Campfire Girls, today it has evolved into a co-ed, secular, inclusive youth service organization for boys and girls from three to eighteen years of age.

Camp Fire clubs have been active at First UU Church of Austin for many years. With the help and advice of veteran First UU Camp Fire leaders, I started the "Mighty Platypi" Camp Fire club in 2007. At the time most of our kids were between three and five years old. Today our club is still going strong thanks to the hard work

and dedication of the many families involved. Our kids are now mostly in the six to eight year old range, and we're getting ready to begin our fourth year together this fall.

Fire was the catalyst that

brought me to First UU. Without it I may not have found this wonderful religious community. However, as I've grown in my UU faith, I've realized how much Camp Fire has taught my daughter and I about what it means to be a UU. Taking part in Camp Fire has given us a chance to put into practice the seven principles that we hold dear as Unitarian Universalists.

Camp Fire clubs teach kids to be compassionate in their relationships with both adults and other kids. Democratic decisions, conflict resolution, and

appreciation for the feelings of the other person are all stressed in the program. The children are taught that all people are equal and that they should focus on their similarities instead of their differences. They are given the freedom to express themselves and are encouraged to listen with an open mind to what others have to say.

Camp Fire badges also cover topics such as sports and games, arts and crafts, citizenship, science and technology, both physical and emotional health, and properly caring for our natural environment.

Although clubs are largely parent run at first, as the kids progress and get older

they take on more roles within the group and gain experience in the democratic process, project planning, and group dynamics. Camp Fire clubs also take on service projects in the community and learn the



importance of community involvement and social action. This year, for instance, our

club planned a towel and blanket drive for the Austin Humane Society.

However, it is in its focus on the environment that Camp Fire really shines. In an age where many kids have never even seen the stars at night, Camp Fire provides a way for kids to really experience nature first hand. The seventh principle - respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part - can be a hard concept for children to understand when they're sitting in a church classroom, but Camp Fire gives children a chance to explore

nature for themselves. Our club goes camping at least once every three months and the kids learn essential outdoor skills as well as how to care for and protect the environment. These experiences are reinforced by

badges such as "Wise Old Willie" which teach environmental activism and low impact camping.

In conclusion, I would highly suggest Camp Fire USA to all the UU families in Austin. Not only are the programs fun, but they teach strong ethical and moral values that mesh well with our UU principles. I hope that this article will encourage you to check out the Camp Fire programs that are available at First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin for yourself. Sunday Worship

The time for the Sunday morning Worship Service is 10 a.m.

July 4: Service at 10 a.m. only. "A Government By the People" Rev. Mark Skrabacz. With the recent polls declaring our population's dissatisfaction and distrust of our government, one wonders at whom to point the finger. As the old saying goes, be careful who you point at, because there are three fingers pointing back at you. Is our government not a reflection of our social consciousness? Aren't "we, the people" the authors of our own destiny? On this anniversary of our country's Independence, Mark brings us a message designed to inspire and encourage our participation in the governance of our country...and an understanding of just who is responsible.

July 11: Service at 10 a.m. only. "Tiger Woods and the Beer Cart Girl." Rev. Timothy Tutt Okay, you read that title and you think you know what my sermon's going to be, right? Given the recent Sports news you could make some reasonable assumptions. And that's exactly the point of my sermon, our assumptions aren't always reasonable. Sometimes they're flat wrong, and sometimes they're downright hurtful. But "Tiger Woods and the Beer Cart Girl" has more appeal as a sermon title than "An Examination of Naaman and the Servant Girl in the Book of II Kings." Rev. Timothy Tutt is the Pastor of United Christian Church of Austin -- an Open and Affirming congregation affiliated with the United Church of Christ and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Tim has served that church since June 2001. He is active in interreligious and social justice affairs, having served on the Board of Austin Area Interreligious Ministries for six years and currently serving on the board of Texas Impact. Tim's spouse, Amy is the Austin CROP Walk Coordinator. They have two elementary-aged children in the Pflugerville schools. Rev. Tutt has preached at First UU twice before.

July 18: Service at 10 a.m. only. The Board of Trustees will conduct the service on July 18th. At the service we will introduce our new mission and also introduce our next Interim Minister, the Rev. Ed Brock.

July 25: Service at 10 a.m. only. "What Do Fundamentalists Know About Religion That Unitarians Have Forgotten (and Need to Relearn)?" Gary Bennet. One of the sadder truths of the last half century has been the decline of Liberal Protestant denominations in the US, while Fundamentalists seem to thrive; resurgent Fundamentalism is an uncomfortable reality among other world religions as well. We will try to explore why, and what we can learn from traditional religion about how to prosper and make a difference. Gary Bennett is a UU since 1970 and a member of FUUCA since 2005.

Settled Minister Search is Underway & in Capable, Caring Hands

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I am delighted to report that the Settled Minister Search Committee is up and running. The nine members were introduced and invested at the congregational meeting on May 16. They are Gary Bennett, John Franks, Michael Kersey, Sharon Moore, Maria Nehring, Jill Smith, Lynda West, Dale Whiteaker-Lewis, and Jill Wiggins.

I can say unequivocally that they are capable, widely experienced, attentive, good-hearted, and dedicated to the well-being of our First UU Austin church community. They were selected because they are known and respected by the congregation, have demonstrated compassion, energy and commitment to serving the needs of our community, and their cumulative experience represents the wide-ranging areas of our church.

The Search Committee is charged with discovering who we are today and what we value for our future as a spiritual community; this is a three step process. The first step is gathering the information: hundreds of hours of conversations, meetings and reading and listening to sermons ahead of them. The UUA activities and timeline design call for an information-gathering period over the next several months, during which the committee will talk with the congregation about what qualities you believe are most important in our next settled minister. This information will be collected through surveys, interviews, and group meetings. The second step is to translate this information into a packet that accurately communicates our values and vision and then make it available to prospective candidates and the congregation. The names of all prospective candidates and the deliberations surrounding their candidacy will be held absolutely confidential by the Search committee. The final step is finding and proposing a candidate for senior minister—an individual who is compatible with the congregation and who can help us realize our vision and aspirations. This year-long process is expected to climax in late spring, when the Search Committee presents their selected candidate to the congregation.

To make their work as transparent as possible, the committee will communicate with you, the congregation, regularly through the monthly newsletter, web-page, Sunday announcements, one-on-one conversations, special events, and other avenues. They will staff a booth in the gallery on Sunday when members can respond to your questions and comments. Search Committee members now have distinctive name badges to help you readily recognize those you might not already know.

Please join me and the First UU Austin Board of Trustees in welcoming and offering your support and assistance to these hardworking members of our community. We wish them well. *Michael West, Board Member*Page 5 of 12






350 partner sites which distributed 2 million pounds of food last year. They also advocate to end hunger.



The movie tells the story of a seventh century prophet who, in 23 years,


changed world history and continues to shape the lives of more than 1.2

Summer Curricula and Pennies for Peace

June 6th we started our Summer Curricula, and so far, everything has been running smoothly. The Pre-K class is learning about our church and the UU religion through the "Chalice Children" curriculum. They have been immersed in painting projects, games, and coloring activities every Sunday morning.

Grades K-12 are learning how they can make a positive impact on both a global and local scale through the "Pennies for Peace" curriculum. As part of this curriculum, the RE Department has set out jars with "Pennies for Peace" stickers on them – that the kids helped decorate. Please put your spare pennies in

these jars! At the end of the summer we'll count up all the change and then write a check to the "Pennies for Peace Foundation." The proceeds will go to help fund children's schools in Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Painting Update

The Painting Committee has decided on our color palette! We've picked twelve colors total to use in the rooms and in the hallway. Each room will have about four pastel or light colors to keep color continuity between the rooms. If you're interested in seeing the color schematics, drop by the RE Office on Sunday. We've also decided to use a VOC-Free paint. That means we are using a paint that contains no Volatile Organic Compounds. The Envirosafe semi-gloss coating that we picked will have fewer odors than normal paints and will dry faster. We still need volunteers! We'll be painting some of the weekends in July and August and we don't have enough volunteers signed up.

We still need painting supplies! We're asking for donations of paintbrushes, drop-clothes, paint rollers, paint trays, edging tools, painting tape, scrub-brushes, buckets and whatever other supplies you have sitting around collecting dust! I want to end this monthly report with a part of Aaron's comments to the congregation:

"...I don't think this church is quite done with me. With any luck, I'll be back in Austin in another year, and there's no getting rid of me then. This church is as much my home as Austin is. So before I leave, I want you to promise me one thing. When I'm back next year, I want to find this church to be better than it already is. I want the youth this coming year to have even more opportunities than I had, and to love this church even more than I do. And I want you to treat each other as if you were all still youth, finding new experiences, and running the church not on the usual bills and pledges and cynicism and politics, but on the hope and energy of something completely new.

Every day is a new day, every sunrise is a new sun, and next year, this church will be a new church, for better or for worse.
