Interim Minister UUA. Lena is a Minister of Religious Education and a Board Certified Chaplain, with years of experience as a Director of Religious Education at some of the largest congregations in the Pacific Northwest.

Among her many accomplishments, Lena was the Director of the Department of Religious Education of the Unitarian Universalist Association from 1998 to 2001. She is the author of The 15 Minute Worship Packet for Children's Worship and one of the authors of the Renaissance Modules used by virtually every RE program across the country. She has recently been the Chaplain for Youth, Pacific Northwest District. She is coming out of semiretirement to help, and be of service to, the Austin congregation.

During her time with us Lena will be talking to all religious education staff and all committee members related to religious education to help her develop a thoughtful assessment of our religious education program and its future needs. She is very eager to talk to anyone in the First UU community who can help her help the church. Lena is approaching her task with an open mind and an open heart, with the eyes of someone who sees as an "outsider" with ample practical experience to understand what she sees and give good counsel for setting a future course.

Some of the issues that will be on Lena's mind are these: what would a religious education that is focused on faith development for all ages while encompassing diverse faith

perspectives look like? What does it mean for a religious education program to be fully integrated with all aspects of the life of a congregation?

Lena will be introduced to the congregation during the Oct. 31st service and she will preach during the Nov. 7th service. I hope you can take the time to meet and welcome Lena on these occasions. And don't hesitate to seek her out for an appointment if you feel you have something important to share with her about FUUCA's religious education program.

John Sanders steps down as First UU Pianist and Sexton

It's 9:15 and if you are at church on a Sunday morning you will see a quiet man walking down the halls ringing a small bell to let the folks know that the service is starting. No more. In late October, John Sanders announced he would be retiring from his decades-long service to First UU as both service pianist and sexton. He has been an invaluable member of our church staff, and will be deeply missed.

We are indebted to John for his amazing piano skills, which have been an integral part of our worship services for half a century. As the longest-serving member of our musical staff, he has had a profound effect on shaping First UU's vibrant music program. While we will miss his artistic presence in our services, John remains a vital part of our church's history and heritage.

We could attempt to list the many sexton duties rendered by John during any given week, but such a list could easily fill an entire newsletter! His reliability and acute attention-to-detail have been profound gifts to our church, and in ways impossible to measure. We will certainly have our work cut out for us as we attempt to cover the jobs so faithfully fulfilled by John all these years.

John is also a church historian. When he started playing during the services back in the 60's, John saved all the orders of service. Folks who were trying to find out some historical information could come to him and he would search through the years and help out with accurate information. John lent several pianos to the church to be used in various classrooms. He also became the unofficial proofreader of the Sunday Bulletin and the order of service in the past 4 years. In the morning the staff would come in to work and the publications would be on the desk with corrections clearly marked.

Although it saddens us to see John step down, the happy news is, John will continue to share his music on special occasions, and will remain a valuable member of our religious community.

We plan to honor John more formally in the near future. In the meantime, we thank John for all he has done for the First Unitarian Universalist Church.

These holdings currently amount to over five million prints and negatives, supplemented by books, manuscripts, journals, and memorabilia of significant photographers since the medium's invention.

Sixteen Churches Join Together for North Central Caregivers Concert

Sunday November 14 is the day our church will collect a special offering for North Central Caregivers. With the help of our church and 15 other churches, wthe elderly of our neighborhood maintain their independent living as they reach old age. Friday, December 3rd, at 7:30 our own choir will join those of the North Central neighborhood in representing each church by singing their own choir's selection in a spectacular concert at St. Louis Church on Burnet Road. That has become a big fundraiser for Caregivers. All sixteen churches take part in the concert.

For twenty years our UU church has taken part in giving rides to people over 60 who live in the neighborhood of our 16 churches. This makes it possible to maintain their homes. Because of the willing help of this church we have over 250 seniors who have each year received free assistance in getting to necessary appointments.

Every week we have thirteen or more members who give more than 2 to 3 hours in driving and visiting these independent elderly. They keep close ties to their neighbors. You can understand how important our place is in the Austin activity.

Until I was actually on the board, I wasn't sure what went on at the meetings, but I quickly learned that there was lots of talking, sometimes *loud* talking, and the meetings ran late. Even with a strong resolve to stay on time and on topic the meetings rambled, small matters turned into major sticking points, and we'd all stagger off after several hours wondering if anything had been accomplished.

Three years later I can say that things are much better now. We start on time, take a break midway, and wrap up within three hours! What changed? The improvements grew out of suggestions

from our Executive Director, Sean Hale, our Interim Ministers, and new board members. Some improvements are a direct result of our steady shift towards policy-based governance. But the only reason the changes are *working* is because we have a board of folks who agree to all work together on behalf of the church.

When we sit down together, (on time!) we read our Board Covenant, and then light a chalice to remind ourselves that our time together is distinct and the work we will do is holy work. We've already electronically received, read, and responded to the reports from our executives and senior staff. At the meeting we quickly approve those and move onto items that require discussion and/or action. We are mindful of staying close to the allotted time for each agenda item, and we frequently check to make sure that we are moving forward and not down rabbit holes.

Yes, it's more work to be this mindful, but knowing that the meeting is on track keeps us all in good spirits and there is plenty of laughter as we work. Are we getting more done? Seems like it! Is the church better for it? Absolutely!

Our board of trustees meets at 6:30 p.m. on the third Tuesday of every month. We'd love to have you come observe us at work and we'll even share our snacks. You might even come away with desire to serve as a trustee! *Nell Newton, Past President of the Board of Trustees.*

News from the Settled Minister Search Committee The results from the survey and focus groups are in!

You've told us what you think — about your experiences in the church, your interests and activities, what you like best and where you'd like to see improvement, and the qualities and skills you want in our next minister. We will share this information with ministerial candidates, and it will guide us in selecting the best minister for our congregation.

From August 22 through September 19, 2010, the search committee conducted a survey of members and friends. We modeled it on the sample provided by the UUA and tailored the questions to the First UU community. We delivered the survey online through SurveyMonkey and mailed print copies to those for whom we did not have email addresses. We distributed a total of 515 electronic and paper copies; 296 individuals completed the survey for a 57 percent return rate.

Here is a brief summary of what you told us:

- You come to First UU for Unitarian Universalist beliefs (63 percent), intellectual stimulation (58 • percent), and community (57 percent).
- You identify most closely with humanism (57 percent) and naturalistic theism (31 percent) • viewpoints.
- Other faiths—Christianity (74 percent), Buddhism (40 percent), and Religious Humanism (26 percent)-have influenced your religious development.
- You want our next minister to be first and foremost a strong spiritual and intellectual leader, ٠ followed in descending order by: skilled at involving people in congregational life, committed to social activism, good at pastoral care, and an effective administrator.
- The minister's chief priority is to present stimulating and challenging Sunday services (83 percent). ٠
- Demographically, ours is an aging congregation (27 percent are ages 60-69). Sixty percent are • women. We are highly educated, with 91 percent holding bachelor's degrees or above.

During the month of September, we also conducted four focus groups to get additional feedback from congregants and met with students in RE classes. 

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



what you witnessed? Did you have any insights? What moved you- maybe to tears? Why? Have you been inspired to change how you act? Has your world view changed in any way?


All of that while eating free popcorn. So what's new?


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Babette's Feast




In 19th century Denmark, two adult sisters live in an isolated village with their father, who is the honored pastor of a small Protestant church that is almost a sect unto itself. Although they each are presented with a real opportunity to leave the village, the sisters choose to stay with their father, to serve him and their church. After some years, a French woman refugee, Babette, arrives at their door, begs them to take her in, and commits herself to work for them as maid/housekeeper/ cook. Sometime after their father dies, the sisters decide to hold a dinner to commemorate the 100th anniversary of his birth. Babette experiences unexpected good fortune and implores the sisters to allow her to take charge of the preparation of the meal. Although they are secretly concerned about what Babette, a Catholic and a foreigner, might do, the sisters allow her to go ahead. Babette then prepares the feast of a lifetime for the members of the tiny church and an important gentleman related to one of them. This Danish film, which won



the 1987 Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film, is based on a short story by Isak Dinesen, author of "Out of Africa". Written and directed by Gabriel Axel, this literate and lovelyto-look-at film compels us to meditate upon the

needs of the flesh and the needs of the spirit. It is also about choices, talent, gratitude, friendship, grace, and hope. D. H. Lawrence once stated: "The sense of wonder, that is our sixth sense. And it is a natural religious sense." This film speaks lovingly to all six of your senses.

You'll get to discuss how wonderful RE Teachers are, what the Spiritual Movie is for the month, and talk about your volunteer experience to recruit others to volunteer.

Volunteer in the Religious Education Office! The whole church is getting a new comprehensive database system soon. We will need volunteers to help us enter class and registration information into the database and to help us organize, file and clean out all of the paper documents we have. GUEST AT YOUR TABLE 2010-2011

The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee's (UUSC) "Guest at Your Table" social service project combines advocacy, education, and partnerships with grassroots organizations, to promote economic rights, advance environmental justice, defend civil liberties, and preserve the rights of people in times of humanitarian crisis.

This is how it works: each family or individual will receive one "Guest at Your Table" box to take home and place in a prominent spot (usually at the meal table). The box is a reminder of this year's different "guests," and the contributions they make to the movement for universal human rights. Families are asked to put small change, checks, or cash in the boxes on a daily basis. This money will go to the UUSC, and then to this year's guests.

Each box is accompanied by a "Stories of Hope" booklet, which connects people in the United States and around the world who have shared their personal struggles and are working hard for human rights in partnership with UUSC.

This year we are kicking of the "Guest at your Table program" on Sunday, November 21st. You may pick up your box at the RE Table in the Gallery on this date. The program will end on January 30th.



This year's "guests" are:

Opoka Kenneth. A Northern Uganda villager who has just recently returned home from an internally displaced persons camp, where he was forced to live. UUSC is working with him, and other villagers like him, to help rebuild homes, revitalize traditions, and come together as a community to heal.

Maral. An Afghani teacher. She

participated in the UUSC's Teacher Training for Human Rights, and now incorporates that knowledge into her lessons. She helps her students to better understand their individual human rights, focusing especially on the rights of women and girls. Maral also trains other teachers to include these rights in their curriculum.





Carmen Molina. A Guatemalan leader for worker's rights with UUSC's partner STITCH. Carmen worked for more that 24 years on a banana plantation in Guatemala, and witnessed many injustices against workers, particularly women. She learned leadership and activist skills through STITCH and was empowered to bring women's issues to the table in union negotiations.

El Movimiento Mi Cometa a UUSC partner in Ecuador is helping

to implement the human right to water.

You can read more about these "guests" in your "Stories of Hope" booklet. Sharing our blessings through "Guest at Your Table" ensures that UUSC's human rights work continues.
