Lara made <u>everyone</u> feel welcome and cared deeply for our community, particularly the well-being of our children. Sadly, in mid-October, she resigned her position as the Director of Religious Education at First UU. Lara served as the DRE for three-and-half years and before that she was Children's Programming Assistant for five years, and a member even longer. Lara's support was instrumental in creating some of our favorite programs. To

name just a few, this includes the children's choirs, Camp UU (aka Hogwarts), the Sparkle Plenty fund raisers, and the Christmas Pageant.

There are not enough words to express all that Lara was to this community, but she is most beloved for her compassion and kind heart that she showed without reservation to the many, many people in this church and the example that she set for our children with that spirit. While Lara may no longer be filling the role of DRE, we

most certainly recognize that we as a community have a responsibility to continue to recognize and support the religious education programs of this church; this is perhaps the best way in which we can honor and celebrate all that Lara gave to all of us.

Justice is LVVE in Action

I'm afraid. Afraid enough to resort to scare tactics to get your attention. On Saturday, November 14, I attended a workshop given by Texas Impact, a liberal coalition of religious organizations. The workshop gave an overview of the upcoming legislative session. I don't have to tell you things are bad – extreme budget shortfall, redistricting, assaults on our public education system (hello vouchers!), and major environmental legislation.

But there is one issue that stands out above all the others: IMMIGRATION. Already there is a raft of Arizonastyle bills. Bills that: demand school districts determine the immigration status of each of their students, require police officers to check immigration status, and punish state and local governments for failing to fully enforce federal immigration law. For alternatives to these punitive scenarios that address problems in our broken immigration system, look to the Utah Compact, an attempt to influence the debate with an eye towards, compassion, reason, and inclusion. Our own denomination, the Unitarian Universalist Association, was loud and proud in Arizona, with many members and clergy arrested for peaceful protest. The UUA's Standing on the Side of Love Campaign is focused on immigration as a human rights issue. As a congregation in our state's capital, we should be working with them to bring their resources to bear here and now in Texas. 

Board Talk: The Path to Policy Based Governance

So much is happening at First UU these days. It seems that every week our weekly announcements refer to "another busy Sunday" or "another big weekend" or simply "lots happening." Your Board of Trustees has been very busy as well.

By the time this newsletter is published, the board will have spent a weekend developing policies that are a very significant step in our transition to Policy Based Governance.

In September Joe Sullivan, our consultant from Unity Consulting, conducted training on Policy Based Governance for church leaders at the quarterly All Council meeting. The board provided an overview of our policy based governance transition, including key milestones such as the board decision in August to adopt a Single Executive Model that gives oversight of most committees to the minister. We had a spirited discussion that followed great questions from those present, such as "Why are we moving to a single executive model?" Will we lose spontaneity and bottom up creativity by building an executive lead model? How will all members of this system (including committee chairs) trust in the governance process and agree to be called back into covenant? One of the hardest questions to answer was "What has been our method of governance up to now?" simply because it seems as if our method of governance in the past has not been clearly defined.

At the conclusion of the meeting Sean Hale, our Executive Director, provided a beautiful analogy that addressed many of the questions. One of the greatest blessings of our church is our wonderful music program that for many years has been home to many talented musicians of all styles, instruments and voices. The beautiful music they create would not be possible without a strong conductor, our Director of Music, Brent Baldwin. Sean compared the work of our various ministries and committees to making music. In this sense, we have been without a strong conductor. Instead, we have at times had a concert hall filled with cacophony. Individuals and small groups each played their own music with little coordination or guidance. Sometimes we have had two or three groups playing simultaneously and just turning up the volume to try to drown the other out in order to be heard (not out of ill will, that's just the way it is).

Even many small groups, without clear conducting, couldn't make beautiful music together.

Now, with our clear mission, values and ends that form the essential foundation of Policy Based Governance, our church community has selected music we can all play together and feel good about. We can work together in harmony to perform a symphony. We can fill the music hall with a beautiful sound because we will know what music we should be playing. We will continue to have many instruments but one orchestra with one conductor playing one symphony.

If this peaks your interest in learning more about Policy Based Governance and deciding whether you are interested in taking a greater leadership role as we continue our transition, please make plans to attend a training on this subject provided by the board on Wednesday, January 19th, in the Gallery, immediately following the January Meet and Eat. The training will begin with a presentation by the Nominating Committee to initiate the annual nominating process for church leadership roles. annual nominating process for church leadership roles.

We have received our first list of candidates for settled minister. We can't tell you their names or share any details about them, but we can tell you that they seem excited about our church and come with many different experiences and backgrounds. Ministers will be able to apply for the position through December to the UUA Transitions Office in Boston. The UUA is the central repository for all the ministers' applications but does not filter or screen our list. We are in direct contact with each candidate and are currently immersed in learning all we can about them. We are reading their online Ministerial Records and will decide carefully with whom we will exchange more extensive information. We are thrilled to have finally reached this point in our process!

By early January, we will have narrowed down the list of applicants and will select up to three as precandidates. We will invite the candidates to meet with us in Austin for extensive interviews, and we will have the opportunity to see them preach in a neutral pulpit.

We have compiled lots information about First UU for our candidates and would like to share it with you. Stop by our table in the Gallery following services to look through the packet. 

The South West UU Conference in Glen Rose Texas was an intense educational **experience for me**. I participated in the Small Group Ministry / Covenant Groups track. It appears the phrases **Small Group Ministry** and Covenant Groups are used interchangeably among UU Churches. However, I did learn about two different types of Covenant Groups that I had not been aware of: Affinity Groups and Chalice Circles.

Affinity Groups are covenant groups that are based on common areas of interest or affinity or a specific demographic. Some examples of these from our church are: Women's Spirituality Group, The Men's Group, The Women in Transition Group, and The Young Adults Group among others. Affinity groups tend to garner a lot of interest when they first formulate. Affinity Groups can develop a strong group identity and over time often have a core set of members who meet and stay together for many years. Affinity Groups are an important part of a Covenant Group program, but if that is all you have, your program is incomplete.

Chalice Circles follow a simple structured group process that allows you to go deeper in an intimate and safe environment with a group of 6-10 congregants who are diverse in age, gender and areas of interest. Chalice Circles are led by facilitators who are trained and supported by the minister of the church. Chalice Circles break into 2 different groups when the size of a group goes past 10. This ensures that each group provides a consistent level of intimacy, allowing for maximum depth of sharing and listening. Each Chalice Circle session has a set of questions for the group members to focus on for the meeting. How these questions are chosen depends on the church.

The Baton Rouge church in Louisiana has a very robust Chalice Circle Program. Their facilitators attend training and support meetings every month. Their Chalice Circles leaders choose questions from a book of sessions provided to the leaders or from the UU Small Group Ministry Network website, depending on the needs of the group.

One of the most striking elements to the Baton Rouge program is how they approach new members in their church. Potential new church members are required to attend a day long workshop, or 3 nights of classes, where among other things, they experience being in a Chalice Circle together. Being able to share and listen deeply is often what people are looking for from their church experience. While Sunday Worship can be inspiring, you can't experience the deep relationships that tend to happen quickly in a Chalice Circle. At the end of their New Member Orientation, members have a choice to join one of the existing Chalice Circles or form their own if a trained facilitator is available.

The leaders of our conference track stressed that starting and supporting a robust Covenant Group program takes substantial time, effort and commitment from a church. They recommended going through a planning and engagement process that can take more than 6 months before a church is ready to launch a program with trained facilitators and a program coordinator. However, Chalice Circles are one of the best ways to retain members and develop a church culture of deep and respectful listening.

A first step in supporting Covenant Groups at our church is to redesign our new member orientation **process.** We don't want to reinvent the wheel, so we will work with what we have and what other churches use, to create a new member orientation that represents our church at it's best. The Adult Religious Education Committee has unanimously agreed to support this effort with sponsorship from board member Eric Hepburn. The first two meetings for working on New Member Orientation will be at Church on:





