Volunteer and Membership Coordinator

To be a good steward means to take good care of the resources with which you have been entrusted. For a congregation to be a good steward, it has to take care of itself, having a strong worship life, a stimulating intellectual life, delightful music, ongoing education and faith development, reaching out to those who are suffering, steeping its children in strong values and a sense of heritage, and working to heal the world's ills. It must use money well and be financially strong.

Right now the congregation is talking about a desire to be radically hospitable. At the same time as we are exploring what radical hospitality means, we also must accomplish regular hospitality. Regular hospitality entails having space for fellowship and coffee, having good signs up directing people to an obvious front entrance, providing enough parking, displaying a welcoming attitude, and offering good content. Regular hospitality means that we continue to build a process whereby new visitors are welcomed, informed and encouraged. If they decide to become members, it means having a process by


which they are drawn in to the congregation, assisted in making connections, shepherded along through their whole first year of membership until they have a solid sense of belonging to this community.

The goal of this year's canvass is not only to give this church the dignity of being well-funded, but to have a Volunteer and Membership Coordinator who can take new members and guide them personally through their first year of membership, connecting them with small groups, with good ways of meeting people, learning what their hopes and gifts are, matching those to the church's ministries, matching what the new members need with the gifts this church has to offer.

I like that the building, like our faith, has many, many ways in. Unfortunately, during the week, this can lead to people with ill intent wandering through, and we had a theft last month. We want our staff and members to feel safe in the building, so we are thinking together about how to balance welcome and safety.

One of the very first tasks of the Volunteer and Membership Coordinator would be to help us staff a "church greeter" desk. The building is open many, many hours every day, but at least from nine until five we would like to have a volunteer to receive those who come into our building with a smile, who would help them find what they needed. Having a greeter would let our phone be answered more often by a friendly human voice. It

would enable the staff to focus on their given jobs, and it would help with our sense of safety. So I hope that, this stewardship season,we can lift this church up to the next level of its development, where we are being responsible about the resources that are pouring through our doors on Sunday. May we all find our place and our sense of belonging.

dishes at church dinners in lieu of paper. We're not slackers, but we're not resting on our laurels either! Several weeks ago we had an energy audit performed by Austin Energy. The good news is that we are miles ahead of most churches in the Austin area in sustainability practices. Since the audit we have fixed AC leaks and planned a timer for the water heater in the bathrooms in the front foyer so it heats water only when we need it.

Last week FUUCA received a letter from the Mayor thanking us for renewing our participation in the Green Choice energy program. As a Green Choice customer we support energy generated from clean, renewable sources when we're not using the energy from our own solar panels!

October 2: Martha Owen: "Workers' Rights and Victories in a Right-Wing, Right-to-Work State." Star labor lawyer, Martha Owen, will examine the labor and employment protections that exist, yes, even in Texas, and highlight how workers have used those rights to exercise power and achieve justice in the workplace. 

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Building a New Way with Stewardship

In September the Stewardship Committee recruited 33 canvassers and held three successful and enjoyable canvass training sessions.

The canvassers are now in the process of calling you and arranging a meeting time to have a conversation about the church. This

year's approach is different, with an emphasis on face to face meetings

between canvassers and the congregation. We are ready to meet, and hope you are too.

This is a year of great excitement and hope because we have Meg as our new minister. We want to help her learn about our thoughts and dreams. We

started this process on August 28 at the pizza lunch with the wall of wishes on

post-it notes. We continue it with a short survey which is part of our pledge form. The canvassers will present the survey's questions to you, and your answers will provide Meg with information so that she will better understand her congregation and be better able to serve us.

You may help the canvass effort by promptly returning calls from your canvasser and agreeing to a meeting. It can also be helpful for each of you to go over your budget and think about what a reasonable

amount to pledge would be. For those of you who have a partner, this becomes a family conversation. Please have that conversation early, rather than at the and of the compaign in Nevember. Ou

the end of the campaign in November. Our last day of active campaigning is November 6. After that, we have

to turn in a number for total pledges to the Board of Trustees for Budget approval.

There is not much time available before the Congregational Meeting in early December, when the budget is approved.

Pledges usually make up at least 75% of the budget. Sean and Meg have come up with a budget which includes \$690,000 in pledges. This is approximately 30% more than last year's. The increases are across the board, to make

the church run more efficiently. This budget

is essential for us to move out of a culture of scarcity to achieve a culture of abundance. We must have enough money to do what we want and need to do, to fulfill our mission, and to be able to constructively channel the efforts of our many enthusiastic volunteers. 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Special Offering for October Sunday October, 9th

The state legislature's \$500,000 budget cut to People's Community Clinic has turned back the clock on women's health to the days before Texas women had access to regular, affordable healthcare. Women's health and wellness services have always been a key component of PCC's practice, and the clinic remains committed to providing these services. With access to high quality, affordable care at every stage of life, 10,000 patients rely on PCC; 2,300 women use the clinic for health and wellness services each year. In addition to providing family planning and contraception, PCC offers Well Woman exams that can screen for diabetes, breast and cervical cancer, HIV, hypertension, anemia, and sexually transmitted diseases. The clinic also offers women laboratory testing, instruction in breast self-examinations, and reproductive health and disease prevention education.

Although state funding never fully covered the cost, the extreme cuts that came from the 2011 legislative session put this care at risk. 




Heritage Book Club


Mind and Meaning Book Club

Youth and Young Adult Ministry

In September we kicked off a new curriculum social justice curriculum for the middle school youth called "Heeding the Call." The youth worked on beginning to see themselves as social activists and they learned about our UU heritage of social justice movements. This month they will work to understand why social justice is important to our religious community, they will examine how empathy can help bring about the changes in themselves that they want to see in the world, and they will build the courage and community they need to make a real difference in the world.

September also saw changes to our high school youth program, including a change in the time and format of our YRUU youth group. The education component of our youth group this year is a world religions curriculum called "Building Bridges." Last month the high school youth learned about the importance of recognizing that all of the major world religions can bring a piece of the larger story into our personal theology. They also

learned about the history of our own faith tradition. In October they will begin branching out into the study of the major world religions, beginning with the indigenous religions of the world and then moving on to Hinduism. The goal of this curriculum is to give the youth tools to help them incorporate stories and ideas from the world's many faith traditions into their own personal faith and to foster their UU identity. During the weekend of October $21^{st} - 23^{rd}$, the high school youth will also be attending our cluster's youth rally in San Antonio, where they will meet with other youth from around the state.

Overall I'm very excited about what this year – and especially the next few months – will bring. I hope you'll take the time to check in with the youth in our congregation and let them know how important they are to you and to the congregation as a whole.
