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Sunday Worship

Join us in the Sanctuary at 9 a.m. or 10:30 a.m.

January 1: "Burning Bowl" Rev. Meg Barnhouse. We will talk about letting go, about clearing out the old as we get ready for what's coming next. There will be a fire in which we can burn papers on which we have written the things we want to allow to pass out of our lives.

January 8: "The Democratic Process" Rev. Meg Barnhouse. Our fifth principle talks about affirming and promoting the democratic process in our congregations. Does that mean every voice should be heard? How should it be heard?

January 15th: "A Stone of Hope" Rev. Meg Barnhouse. How can we begin to dismantle racism in our hearts and minds? How can we dismantle it in the structures of our society? Are all humans racist when they are born? What transformations might we hope for?

January 15: Service of Installation at 4 p.m. in the Sanctuary

January 22: "Mary, Mary, Quite Revolutionary" with Marisol Caballero who reflects on the symbolism of the Virgin of Guadalupe as a feminine image of the Divine. How may this "goddess", native to the Americas, speak to us, as Unitarian Universalists, as well as unite diverse populations in compassion, perseverance, and justice?

January 29: "Afri-Kin" The choir will perform three of Kiya Heartwood's choral works. Rev. Meg Barnhouse will preach, and she collaborated with Kiya Heartwood on the readings. Science is showing us that we are all related to an African woman we call —Mitochondrial Eve, and we can trace each person's ancestry through their mother's mitochondrial DNA, from mother to mother, all the way back to one of 26 "daughters of Eve."

Summary of December 20th Board Meeting

Routine board business included: receiving a report on Yew Grove activities including their recent gift of books to the library, signing appreciation cards, approving final board policies, delegating policies and procedures manual to Rev Meg, debriefing the congregational meeting, receiving an internal audit update, Rev Meg's report about the welcome area construction and her Jan 15 installation, information on mission-based budgeting, and determining whether current board policies are sufficient to cover internet privacy issues.

Revisions to our end on radical hospitality were approved that include language more inclusive of all people of goodwill, outreach that invites others to join our spiritual community, and individual public affirmation of the UU principles underlying our social justice work. (E.g., "As a UU, I believe in marriage equality.")

With radical hospitality on our minds, the board continued discussion of questions raised by Chapter 2 of *Almost Church—Revitalized*: How does the church welcome diversity (e.g., Republicans, Christians)? What is the church's role in the modern civil rights movement and politics? How can the church express its values in the public arena? When and by what process should the church take official positions on controversial issues when there is no consensus (e.g., the death penalty)? Although further discussion of these questions among members is desirable, a forum for such is not yet clear.

Discussion of Chapter 3 of *Almost Church—Revitalized* was on the roles of leadership versus caretaking, which each includes, and when and where should board activity fall on the continuum between the two. Questions included: How do we nurture ideas? What permission do new ideas need? What does it mean to say yes to as much as possible? Discussion will continue at the January board meeting. *-Margaret Borden, Member of Board*

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The Forum

Join us in the Sanctuary at 11:45 a.m. following the second service.

January 8: "Austin"Kathie Tovo, the newest member of the Austin City Council. A longtime neighborhood activist, with a PhD from UT, she served on the city Planning Commissio, and the AISD's Community Committee on Neighborhoods and Schools before her election to our city council. Married, and the mother of two, she'll speak about her vision for Austin.

January 15: "Politics and the Power of Pictorial Symbolism" with Ben Sargent, Austin American Statesman cartoonist, Pulitzer Prize winner in 1982 and distributed nationally by Universal Press Syndicate since 1985! He will discuss cartoons as an ideal and unique medium for conveying opinion and will show some of his work. Born in Amarillo into a newspaper family, he studied journalism at U.T. Austin and drew cartoons for the Austin American Statesman beginning in 1974 to 2009. He has served as President of the Association of American Editorial Cartoonists. He is the author of two books and has won numerous awards for his work.

January 22: "Searching for the Most Distant Galaxies in the Universe" with Dr Finkelstein. The recent upgrade of the Hubble Space Telescope has opened a new window on the distant universe. Over the past year we have been able to discover the most distant galaxies ever. Dr. Finkelstein will discuss how we identify these most distant galaxies, and what their nature tells us about how galaxies form and evolve. He will also discuss the HETDEX project, which will use distant galaxies to probe the nature of Dark Energy. Steven Finkelstein is a Hubble Fellow in the Astronomy Department at UT Austin. He lives in Austin with his wife, Keely, who is also an astronomer at UT, and their young son.

January 29: The Role of Money in Politics" with Gaye Kopas, Stewart Snider, and Joanne Richards. They discuss how money has corrupted the political process and how to organize our citizenry to reclaim our democracy. A documentary, "Priceless," will be shown. Gaye Kopas and her husband are Co Chairs Health Care for All Texans. Stewart Snider is President of the League of Women Voters in Austin and a campaign planner of Coffee Party. Joanne Richards is the President of the Board of Coffee Party Austin and a retired U.T. public policy expert. All are dedicated activists who encourage public policy discussion and civic engagement..

MEMBERSHIP: THE VISITORS KEEP COMING!

We are averaging 8 to 10 FIRST TIME visitors every week. This doesn't count returning visitors.

Introduce yourself to any unfamiliar face or to people wearing RED BORDERED NAME TAGS (this indicates a first time visitor) or BLUE BORDERED NAME TAGS (this indicates a returning visitor). Go out of your way to greet visitors in the welcoming portion of the church service itself.

After the service, visit Howson Hall and seek out visitors. Hang out around our new Welcome table in Howson Hall, where visitors are likely to migrate. Include visitors in your conversations with fellow members.

Reflections from UUA President, Rev. Peter Morales



One of the areas of work of <u>our Association</u> that I am most excited about is the expansion of our international connections. We have a long and proud history of <u>international work</u>. We also have the opportunity to take it to a new level.

One of the ways we are doing this is expanding our partnership with the <u>Unitarian Universalist Service Committee</u> (UUSC) to provide international opportunities for learning and service. When I served as a parish minister I saw for myself how direct experience with other cultures and with issues of justice transforms people. I went on trips

to Guatemala and Mexico with members of my congregation and saw them return as human rights activists for life. I also saw how the life of our congregation was changed—from worship to religious education to public

witness. Right now a group of UUs is in Haiti on a JustWorks trip that is a cooperative effort of the UUA and the UUSC. We can follow along in blogs by the participants. I urge you to read what participants have to say about their experience. I have a dream that all our ministers and religious professionals will have the experience of a culture in the developing world. I also dream that UUs of all ages, especially our youth and young adults, will have the opportunity to learn and serve together. We are taking steps to make that dream a reality. 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Social Action is Love in Action

January's Monthly Special Offering Recipient

On Sunday, January 8th, Interfaith Action of Central Texas (iACT) will be First UU's monthly special offering recipient at both services. iACT's mission is to "cultivate peace and respect through interfaith dialogue, service, and celebration." The deepest expression of iACT's mission is found in two exceptional service programs: Hands on Housing (repairs the homes of senior citizens living in poverty in East Austin) and the iACT for

Refugees School (offers newly arrived refugees English as a Second Language classes and assistance transitioning into US culture). In addition, iACT encourages healthy, respectful interfaith relationships through its ongoing Red Bench interfaith dialogue program, which allows individuals from many different traditions the opportunity to explore the different points of connection between their faiths as well as their own distinctive faith journeys. Finally, iACT gathers the community together for interfaith worship and celebration at events like the annual Interfaith Thanksgiving Service and this year's Interfaith Memorial Service commemorating 9/11.

Many members of our congregation have been actively involved with iACT (formerly Austin Area Interfaith Ministries) for years and participate in Hands On Housing, the Red Bench, CROP Walk, the Annual Interfaith Thanksgiving Service, and more. UUs are interfaith seekers, so there is a natural connection between 1st UU and iACT. You are encouraged to give generously to iACT during the monthly special offering collection on January 8th. Monthly Special Offerings for 2012

On the second Sunday of each month, we pass an additional plate in support of a charitable organization that helps us extend our mission to nourish souls, transform lives, and do justice. Red Bench Interfaith Dialogue

Tuesday, January 24th from 6 to 8 p.m., the theme of "Leadership" will be discussed at the Red Bench, a structured dialogue program of Interfaith Action of Central Texas (iACT). Red Bench was inspired by Dr. Betty Sue Flowers several years ago when she encouraged organizations to place red benches in public spaces; her idea was that sitting on the red bench would signal to others that you were seeking to have a conversation about something that really mattered to you. Come join people of diverse faiths on January 24th for the Red Bench small group discussions at the Family Life Center of First United Methodist Church, 1300 Lavaca. A light vegetarian meal will be served at 6:00 p.m., and the structured dialogue begins at 6:30.

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Chalice Circles are lay-led small groups designed to deepen and expand the ministry of a congregation. The purpose of this program is to build community and provide opportunities for deeper relationships and deeper spiritual exploration and search for meaning. Groups will be small (6-8 people) and will meet twice a month to discuss a variety of topics and perform at least one service project as a group. You do not have to be a member of the church to join a group, but you have to be involved in other church functions or groups in order to fulfill the mission of expanding the ministry of the church. That could mean as little as attending services on a regular basis or participating in one of the other covenant groups or religious education programs but your connection to the church must extend outside of the Chalice Circles.

On December 17, members of the two pilot groups that have been meeting since February came together to receive additional training as facilitators. Most of them were present at the original training back in February led by former adult RE staff member, Lansing Bicknell and our former interim pastor, Ed Brock. Many thanks to those two for helping get this program started at FUUCA.

An orientation is being planned for registered participants in mid-January to help participants better understand the Chalice Circles program. More details will follow so be sure to check the weekly announcements

We are expecting to receive \$8,160 which would bring us to \$567,537 in total pledges. Pledging can take place all year long. You can still contact the email address: Stewardship@austinuu.org, stop by the church office and pick up a pledge form, or phone the office bookkeeper to give your pledge.

We hope that as we build we will have raised awareness of how much it takes in time, talent and treasure to keep things running smoothly. We focused on treasure: encouraging financial support is our responsibility. In the future we hope more people think in terms of giving a percentage of their income, as able, within UUA guidelines. We have reached for 5%, but now the ultimate goal is 10%. 

You have undoubtedly noticed some construction by the office.

In mid-December, we began a remodeling project to create a welcome center. You will have a space where everyone who visits during the week can receive a warm welcome, where lively conversations can happen without disrupting vital office functions, and where callers can reach a live person during the day. This is another step towards your goals, as articulated in your mission and ends, of gathering in community, being more welcoming and hospitable, and finding connection in fellowship.

Once the dust has cleared, you will find that a portion of the main office has been repurposed to expand the main entryway from the courtyard. This will create a space for welcoming that looks and feels like what other successful churches use.

During the few weeks of construction, with its noise and dust, your office staff will focus their energy on ensuring that the basics and mission-critical activities get covered. That includes mailing your 2011 giving statements mailed no later than January 31. Throughout construction time, and during our catch up period once its complete, our response time will likely be slower than usual.

We thank you in advance for your support and understanding. Whatever temporary inconveniences we may encounter over the next few weeks will be more than offset by the long-term positive impact on the life of the church.

One additional bonus: as a congregation considering construction, this will give us a tiny preview of the excitement of building something new and its impact on day-to-day operations! *Sean Hale*
