

In its last meeting, the Church Council leaders voted for "Enoughness" as our spring theme. From our kick-off on March 11th through Passover/Easter and beyond, we will be asking ourselves "What is enough money? What is enough consumption? What is enough freedom to do what we want to do

and use what we want to use?"

Enoughness is a Quaker concept, having to do with a "right sharing of the world's resources." Richer countries have a large foot print, consuming a disproportionate and unsustainable share of the world's resources. The spiritual core of environmental concern is to realize that we are part of a large, connected and sacred universe. It is a tenet of faith and hope to believe that everyone can have enough.

We as spirited/spiritual people can question our desires, to ask ourselves what would be enough for us, and to be satisfied with our lives. We can also ask ourselves how we might work to bring enough to those who do not have it. Our seventh principle says that we affirm and promote "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." If we look at the ethic of enoughness, it gives us a way to be aware of our connection to the whole. It poses a challenge to our over-consumption and gives a hopeful promise to the impoverished of the earth. How might we discern ethical lifestyles that honour the well-being of people we do not know? Do we see ourselves as morally bound to protect the poor and the weak? Can our global economy and the global ecosystem be such that everyone has enough? -The Rev. Meg Barnhouse

Sunday, March 11th "Firsts First" Enoughness kick-off with Dick Pierce of the Austin Permaculture Guild. Bill Mollison, one of the forbears of the permaculture movement, has described permaculture as "a philosophy of working with, rather than against nature; of protracted and thoughtful observation rather than premature and thoughtless labor; and of looking at plants and animals in all their functions, rather than treating any area as a single project system."

Wednesday, March 14th at 6:45 is Enoughness movie night: Come have dinner at 5:45 and watch Affluenza, a one-hour television special that explores the high social and environmental costs of materialism and overconsumption. We will watch it and discuss it afterward. Af-flu-en-za n. 1. The bloated, sluggish and unfulfilled feeling that results from efforts to keep up with the Joneses. 2. An epidemic of stress, overwork, waste and indebtedness caused by dogged pursuit of the American Dream. 3. An unsustainable addiction to economic growth. 4. A television program that could change your life.

Sunday, March 18th is "buy nothing day" Can we do it? Whether we can or not, we will make ourselves aware of how much unmindful buying we tend to do. A recent Gallup poll says that Americans spend, on average, about \$60 each day, not counting things like rent/mortgage, car payments, and utilities.

How hard would it be to go an entire day without spending any money? Challenge yourself to find out on First UUA's Buy Nothing Day!

Friday, March 23rd Grove Burnett will be leading a short mindfulness (meditation) retreat on Friday afternoon, March 23 in the sanctuary. He is the Founding Teacher and Director of the Vallecitos Mountain Ranch in New Mexico.

March 4: Rev. Meg Barnhouse: Purim is the Jewish festival celebrating a time long ago when the Jews were saved from destruction by the brave Queen Esther. What's the story? Get ready to boo the bad guy.

March 11: Dick Pierce "Firsts, First:" Each of us doing what we can so that all human creatures, big and small, young and old, here and elsewhere - have enough nutritious food, shelter, clothing, and meaningful work to meet the minimum requirements for survival. Then, and only then, should we in the US and the developed world work toward "seconds" or "thirds" for ourselves. Noted sustainability and local food advocate, Dick Pierce, will kick off our Spring theme "Enoughness" (A Quaker term) Dick Pierce is a founding member of the Austin Permaculture Guild, a cofounder, with Brandi Clark of the very successful Austin Citizen Gardener program, and a passionate spokesman for the Environment, for "relocalizing" our food, business, jobs/careers, lives and priorities

March 18: Rev. Meg Barnhouse. The Spring Equinox is coming, when the day and night are the same length. It's a good time to talk about balance, about living gracefully. Do we want to grow deep roots that can hold us steady while all around us things are pushing us one way, then the other? Do we want to learn to be light-footed so we can, as the Zen teacher says, "play ball on running water?" What would good balance look like to you?

March 25: Luther Elmore. "UU Utopias: How Shall We Live?" In the first half of the nineteenth century approximately one hundred utopian societies were established across the United States, several by Unitarians and Universalists. We will look at those UU utopian societies and see what lessons they offer us today.



We Gather in Community to Do Justice

This January, I took a course at Meadville Lombard called "Ecology and Theology" that was both inspiring and terrifying. It was terrifying because the information presented convinced me that we are so far into global climate change that we will likely see some terrible events even if we act effectively beginning now. It was inspiring because we saw in the class how amazing is the human spirit even in the midst of potential tragedy – how people can overcome adversity and find strength in seemingly impossible situations. At First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin, we have long been a Green Sanctuary

and committed ourselves to conservation and sustainability, both here at the church in many of our individual practices. During the class, it became clear to me though, that truly making a difference to mitigate the worst effects of global climate change will require that we address the far greater contributions to green house gasses that are being caused by current industrial, commercial and agricultural practices embedded in economic and governmental structures.

How do we advocate for change at that level? What would that change look like? Can we truly say we are doing justice if we do not work to change the larger, systemic structures that are causing so much of the human suffering and environmental damage we end up working to alleviate? *Chris Jimmerson President of the Board*

March 4: New Directions in Physics with Stephen Weinberg will be speaking is a UT Professor Physics and a Nobel Prize Winner.

March 11: Highlight the impact of Computer Vision on our daily lives today and projected into the future. with Dr. Aggarwal, a Cullen Trust Endowed Professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering at the University of Texas at Austin where he has taught for over 40 years. His research interests have centered on the artificial intelligence of "seeing" with a camera and a computer. He is known internationally and frequently is invited to speak at international meetings and Universities. Computer Vision research and development has moved it's focus away from inanimate objects to recognizing personal characteristics and to monitoring people and their activities in public places. Additional computer applications include the monitoring activities from unmanned aerial drones, guidance assist devices for the blind, classifying and organizing albums of photographs, recognizing human faces and tattoos and as a diagnostic aid and therapeutic tool to combat childhood autism.

March 18: "US Banks after Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act." Karen Neeley, general counsel for the Independent Bankers Association of Texas. Congress responded to the mortgage meltdown and the big bank crisis with the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act. But how did we get to the flash point, and what changes does this massive law make to financial institutions and their regulation in the United States? And what do the consumer protections mean to us? Karen Neeley is a much honored banking lawyer and is presently a trustee for First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin.

March 25: The Civil Rights Movement in Austin in the Fifties, Sixties, and Seventies: A Retrospective and a Work in Progress Bertha Meanss a retired teacher, an owner of Austin Cab, and has been a political activist in Austin over many decades. She was a major force in integrating luncheon counters, swimming pools, and schools in Austin and confronting entrenched racial prejudices in the community. She will discuss the strategies she used to end discriminatory practices and desegregate stores, restaurants, schools, and other public facilities in Austin. She will discuss the changes she as seen in her lifetime and directions for the future.

Summary of February 21st Board Meeting

The board was joined by Joe Sullivan, the consultant who has advised us through both our church's mission work and our transition to policy-based governance.

Rev Meg and Sean presented interpretations of two executive financial limitations for the board's monitoring and approval. Joe suggested that interpretations should state the metrics that will be used to show compliance or progress. He also suggested "defining the standard," e.g., when words like "appropriate" are used in the policy, they should be defined in the interpretation.

The Board reviewed a proposed survey for obtaining feedback from members and friends on how our church is doing in accomplishing our mission and our ministries. The anonymous survey will also request demographics on respondents. An initial trial to obtain baseline information will likely be in the spring.

The board had a lively discussion of chapter 4 of Almost Church-Revitalized around the idea that members should be expected to attended services regularly, the concept of evangelism, and "Anonymous giving promotes anonymous non-giving" (attributed to MLK Sr). Joe suggested ending such discussions with each board member responding to "What have we learned that applies to our values and goals?" or "What does this mean to our work as a board?" The event was organized by human rights group GetEQUAL Texas and attended by a coalition of Occupy Austin, PFLAG, and First UU activists. Media coverage was high and we were featured on both KXAN and FOX news. County Clerk Dana DeBeauvoir, County Clerk, was very sympathetic to the cause and was in tears as she told these couples that she could not give them a license.

Elderhaven, the only licensed Adult Day Centers in Central Texas, provides a safe and interactive environment for medically vulnerably seniors. at our facilities in Central Austin.

Offering therapeutic activities under licensed, medical supervision during the day, specializing in memory loss care. With a loved one spending the day at Elderhaven, family members can return to work, get a break, and even prevent early nursing home placement.

The Caregiver Resource Center provides free referrals, information, and education to seniors and families. Caregiver U, collaboration of 14 agencies providing Free Caregiver education in 4 local counties.

The Health Equipment Lending Program (HELP) provides critical safety and mobility equipment to the Central Texas community in need of wheelchairs, walkers and shower chairs.

The Austin Computer Learning Center is a peer-to-peer senior computer literacy program, engages and connects older adults in new technologies.

A Partnership with Occupy Austin

As you may know, the Austin Occupiers were evicted from City Hall, but they continue to work for positive societal **change.** Many among our congregation have struggled to find a meaningful way to support their work and message, our minister included. Rev. Barnhouse feels this is "such an important movement for our time and it's really important that we be a part of it." Fortunately, she has been able, little by little, to cultivate a relationship with several Occupy activists. One way she is doing this is by inviting them up to church for our new weekly "Welcoming Wednesday" dinner for discussion as well as sustenance. This relationship is fairly undefined and it is unclear what direction it will take. However, it has already identified that offers of simple, basic needs like a meal are always welcome. So this is one way we can support this movement – by offering food free of charge. Social Action Committee is currently underwriting their meals up to \$500, which should last for about five months. We are also working on a solidarity statement. Here is a draft:

The First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin and Occupy Austin stand in solidarity. We recognize that our paths share a mutual destination; one that promotes peace, liberty, justice, equity, compassion and the inherent worth and dignity of every person, in every city, state and nation around the world. We further assert the shared ideal of a democratic process where practices are transparent, elections are open to members and ideas are open to criticism - so that people might govern themselves. To these ends we recognize that the earth sustains us and in kind we too should sustain it. Both of our organizations commit to maintaining our autonomy, neither UU nor OA is under the direction of the other but we simply wish to make evident our shared goals for the community

Occupy Austin is also formalizing their structure and figuring out how they can make the most impact in



the Austin community. They want to engage Austin at large and develop partnerships. Recently they hosted a "come one, come all" picnic at Zilker Park so folks could get to know them better. They have developed several sub-groups to address issues such as public education, GLBT rights, mortgage refinance, economic justice, and more. They are eager to work with us through our existing social action programs – several Occupiers came to the Feb. 14 same-sex marriage license action and also plan to attend our April Hands-on-Housing project. Currently the Occupiers are looking for a place to house some of their homeless members, as well as office and meeting space. Come Tour People's Community Clinic

Tuesday, March 6th from 11:30-12:30

We have arranged for People's Community Clinic to offer our members and friends a tour the clinic and meet with staff to hear about their work. We've set the tour for lunch time in hopes that you might be able to bring your sandwich and squeeze this in on your lunch break. Space is limited to 10 individuals.

Since 2006, our church has partnered with PCC to provide volunteers to support their work: working immunization fairs and fundraisers, producing educational materials for patients, providing training, sending appointment reminders, and giving generously to support their financial needs.

People's Community Clinic is at 30th Street and I-35. It is Austin's only independent clinic offering comprehensive health and wellness care to uninsured and underinsured Central Texans, many of them non-English-speakers who encounter barriers to care in most other settings. In the course of a year, the clinic may provide almost 35,000 visits with medical providers.
